Walcott Fires Back at Talk He'll Retire

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) - Jersey Joe Walcott said Tuesday he has every intention of fighting heavy-weight champion Rocky Marciano and to tell the New York State Athletic Commission - Chairman Robert Christenberry in particular - he doesn't need any help in deciding when to retire.

Walcott was incensed by Christenberry's statement Monday night that he (Walcott) very likely will never fight again.

Christenberry told the 4th annual dinner of the Wilmington Sports Writers and Broadcasters Association: "I seriously doubt that Walcott will fight again."

He said limits of the New York Commission and almost every other state say that a fighter cannot be licensed after he is 40 years of age.

"I'll be 39 January 31," said Walcott Tuesday.

"And as far as Mr. Christenberry is concerned, he is nothing but a hotel bellhop. He hasn't done anything for boxing. As far as his saying I am near 40, it would make no difference if I was near 50. I have given my life to boxing and I have never done anything other than respect boxing and respect the public in my entire 22 years of boxing."

Hirsch Puts Heat on Wildcat . . . Ex-Mate Claims Spivey Paid for Point-Shave

NEW YORK (AP) - Bill Spivey, former University of Kentucky All-America basketball player, accepted \$1,000 for juggling points in a game and thought "he should have got more," a former teammate testified Tuesday.

The witness was Walter Hirsch, 23, of Dayton, Ohio, now an Army private.

The seven foot tall Spivey is being tried in general sessions court on a charge of perjury in denying to a grand jury that he ever discredited fixing games or accepting bribes.

Hirsch said Spivey received \$1,000 and that he himself received \$800 for "working" the score in a Kentucky game with the University of St. Louis at the Sugar Bowl tournament in New Orleans in 1950.

"Working" was described as keeping the point spread between the two teams at a predetermined margin for the benefit of gamblers.

Hirsch said he, Spivey and James Line, another Kentucky student accused of being a "go-between," agreed to accept \$5,000 in bribes from Jack West, since convicted as a fixer in the basketball scandal, to "work" two games in the tournament.

But he said West became disgusted when the Kentucky players, in trying to hold the winning margin within the agreed point spread, unintentionally lost the game, 43-42. He said West complained that this ruined his chance of "making big money" on the second game.
