

# Idaho to Host Beaver Quint

## North Division Set Slated for Weekend

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—(Special) — Encouraged by the improved second night showing against Washington but well aware of the importance of their next test, Oregon State's Beavers started preparations Monday for the series with Idaho at Moscow Friday and Saturday.

Washington swept both games, 77-54 and 68-56, but the Orange men looked much better in the final frames and kept pace with the Huskies throughout most of the game. Bob Houbregs, the league leading pointmaker, collected 40 for the two nights, but 16 came as the results of free throws.

**Gill Pleased**  
Coach Slat's Gill was well pleased with the work of Tony Vlastelica, his sophomore center who led the Beavers in scoring Saturday night with 16. The Orange mentor thought Vlastelica turned in his best all-around performance of the season, especially from a defensive standpoint. Also impressive were sophomore Johnny Jaboe and Senior Jim Sugrue.

Gill said Monday that he probably would start the Idaho series with a lineup composed of Sugrue and Tex Whiteman, forward; Vlastelica, center; and Jarboe and Ron Robins, guards. Robins has been in a slump the past several games, but when playing up to par is the most effective long-shot artist on the club.

# Eagles Defeat Cascade, Nab Capitol Lead

# 'Fans Shouldn't Notice'—Grange

CHICAGO (Special)—Red Grange, all-time All-America halfback, said Tuesday abolition of the two platoon system may slow down football, but the average fan won't notice it.

"We won't get a true picture of what the limited substitution rule means for several years," said Grange.

In the mid-century poll of the Associated Press, Grange was an almost unanimous all-time choice, even out-pointing Jim Thorpe.

"But if the game slows down offensively, it also will slow down defensively and I doubt if it will be noticeable to most fans in the grandstands," said Grange.

Grange, Illinois' immortal "Gallop Ghost" of the mid-30's, said he wasn't certain whether the change was a good one, but that he hoped now that it was made, the rules committee doesn't "keep shifting ground from year to year on it."

Grange said he disagrees that the two platoon system cut down injuries.

"Stucks, in the past few years, I've seen as many players hurt in the first five minutes as I have in the last five minutes of a game," said Grange, a radio-TV commentator and insurance executive.

"As a matter of fact, I always have felt that after you get warmed up your chances of being injured are a lot less than when you're just going in."

Neither does Grange expect limited substitution will kill the T-formation and bring on "le-wing power football. The kids like to play the T and coaches know they don't get banged up as much from the best blocking of the T as they would from the "le-wing" blocking of single wing blocking."

# Tulsa Mentor Quits; Lujack To Wyoming?

TULSA, Okla. (Special)—J. O. "Buddy" Brothers, builder of mighty football teams at the University of Tulsa over a 17-year span, quit his head coaching job Tuesday.

Brothers would not elaborate to newsmen. But he did say he hoped Tulsa, Okla. (Special)—Bernie Witucki signed a three-year contract as head football coach of the University of Tulsa Tuesday night only a few hours after J. O. (Buddy) Brothers announced his resignation.

The loss put Kentucky out of the championship play and into a consolation game.

Hirsch did not explain whether this was the reason the eventual pay-off was less than the \$5,000 he said was promised.

The witness also testified that Spivey did not want to fix a game against St. John's University on Dec. 23, 1950, because Spivey was to face a center in that game who was a rival for All-America honors.

Hirsch said his failure to give to the grand jury the information he has given stemmed from his not remembering and a desire to "shield" Spivey.

He admitted he did not tell the complete truth "on occasions" to the grand jury.

But Hirsch was emphatic in declaring he was telling the truth in testifying that Spivey got \$1,000 for his part in the "sugar Bowl" game post shaving.

# LBS Opens Suit Against Majors

CHICAGO (Special)—Trial of the defunct Liberty Broadcasting System's 12 million dollar suit against 13 major league baseball clubs has been set back to May 11, attorneys said Tuesday.

The trial had been scheduled to start this week in Federal Court. Liberty charges that the 13 clubs, their commissioner and league presidents illegally conspired to monopolize and restrain competition in baseball broadcasting, froze out Liberty, and caused the network to lose four million dollars. The suit asked triple damages.
