## All-Year Cooking

### Locally Grown Nuts Offer Many Chances for Interesting Cooking

We are great ones here for local products and every time we get some good recipes for using home-grown foods we like to pass them on—hoping to bolster up business for the farmers and at the same time make the ladies better cooks.

Here then is a collection of recipes using filberts, good for the holiday season, and excellent year-round food.

Filberts are actually good nuts for cooking, they are high in flavor and not too expensive for frequent use—as are some imported nuts.

- FILBERT TOPSY TURVY PUDDING**
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
  - 1/2 cup sugar
  - 1 cup flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon soda
  - 1 teaspoon baking powder
  - 1/2 cup milk
  - 1/2 cup chopped dates
  - 1/2 cup chopped filberts
  - 1/2 cup vanilla
  - 1/2 cup finely ground filberts
  - 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
  - 1 tablespoon grated onion
- Mix all ingredients except chopped filberts with electric mixer, until well combined. Form into ball in small bowl which has been lined with waxed paper. Let stand about 1 hour. Roll in finely chopped filberts. May stand in refrigerator overnight. Let stand at room temperature about 1 hour before serving. Serve with small crackers. Makes a ball about 4 inches in diameter.
- FILBERT CHEESE BALL**
- 2 1/2 ounces blue cheese
  - 5 ounces cheddar cheese (soft)
  - 1 3-ounce package cream cheese
  - 1/4 cup finely ground filberts
  - 1/4 cup finely chopped filberts
  - 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
  - 1 tablespoon grated onion
- Mix all ingredients except chopped filberts with electric mixer, until well combined. Form into ball in small bowl which has been lined with waxed paper. Let stand about 1 hour. Roll in finely chopped filberts. May stand in refrigerator overnight. Let stand at room temperature about 1 hour before serving. Serve with small crackers. Makes a ball about 4 inches in diameter.
- FILBERT OATMEAL CRISPIES**
- 1 1/2 cups rolled oats
  - 1/2 cup shortening
  - 1 cup sugar
  - 2 tablespoons molasses
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1 egg
  - 1 cup sifted flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon soda
  - 1/2 cup chopped filberts
- Toast the rolled oats in a 350 degree oven for 10 minutes. Cream the shortening, sugar, molasses and vanilla. Add the egg. Beat well. Add the sifted flour ingredients. Combine thoroughly. Stir in the toasted rolled oats and the filberts. Drop by teaspoons onto a greased cookie sheet. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 12 to 15 minutes. Yields 3 1/2 dozen.
