Buying for Your Home

Brilliant Chinaware in Collections West Coast Designers are Showing

A great deal of imagination has always been shown by California dinnerware designers. This is particularly evident in the new collections now being shown to the trade. One noticeable trend is the telescoping of floral and leaf designs from dainty rim bands to all-over and large motifs in the center or other surfaces of dishes.

Richard Sear has a tricolor pattern, colorful enough, and unusual enough to be used for decorative accessories. The plates resemble a large flat leaf in silhouette and have center stripes of white with one-side of the plate in yellow, the other in green. A line drawing of an intricate lead appears on each of the colored sections. The cups

and saucers also have the three colors. Another collection offers a set of grey dishes with rims of black and platinum and the center design a large leaf and berry motif in the deeper tones to match the rim.

An example of multicolor patterns for dishes is one with a pale background and flowers and leaves worked in rose, yellow, brown and green. Actually, there are just two large flowers placed on the plate making the design a bold one for plates. The plain casual china is as popular as ever and is seen in many color combinations for both general china and serving pieces.

An unusual set has a spiral pattern of many colors worked from the center out to the rim. For the provincial home there are many new patterns of Pennsylvania Dutch themes in dinnerware.
