

Collections Add to the Home Decor. Can Be Inexpensive, Original, Lovely

An unusual collection of objects often sets a home apart from the ordinary. I knew one family that saved novelty tape measures, some dating back several generations and another that collected miniature pitchers. These were tastefully displayed in living room cabinets and were always a delight to see.

One of the greatest collectors of our time, Mme. Helena Rubinstein, started as a young girl with souvenir spoons. Every time an uncle took a trip she would ask for a souvenir from the places he would visit. Later she collected miniature furniture and often would go without lunch to buy a handsome piece for her collection. The

miniatures are now displayed in tiny "rooms" in her home.

Milk glass is another fancy of this collector who has it in white, pink, blue and black among other hues. In one cabinet, the blues are shaded from near-white at the top to deep navy at the bottom. She often uses her glass dishes on con-asting colored gaudy table cloths since she believes they should not be for display only.

While Mme. Rubinstein has a world famous collection of African primitives and art work and sculptures from many contemporary artists, she points out that an enjoyable collection need not be expensive. For instance, she has fabulous black baroque pearls, but also collects amusing or unusual costume jewelry. She says one's interest in a collection will grow as one becomes more familiar with the history of the pieces and appreciates the beauty of shape and color in which they appear.

Alumnae Fete Mrs. Kern

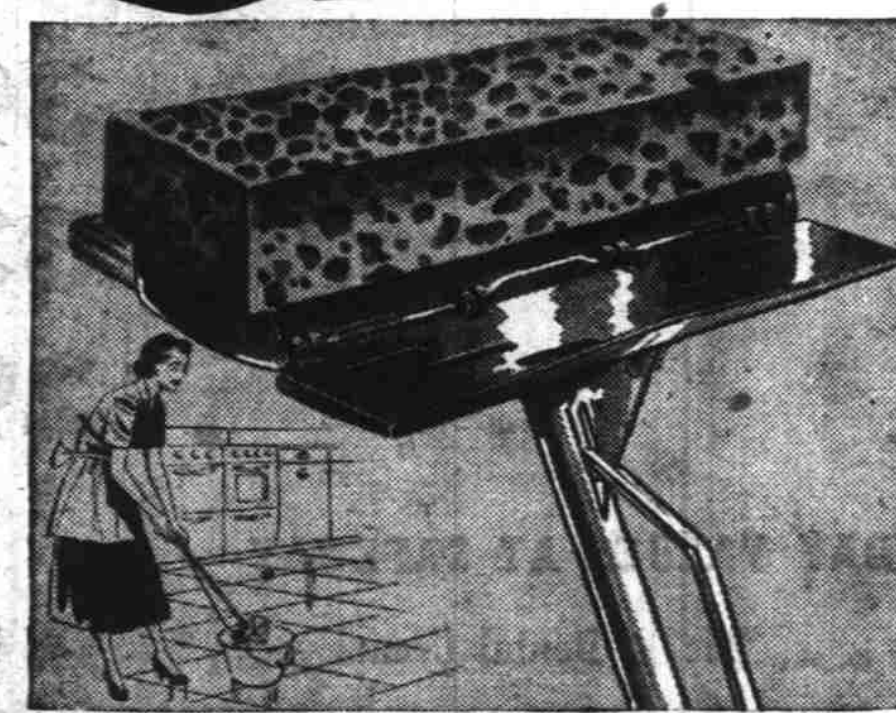

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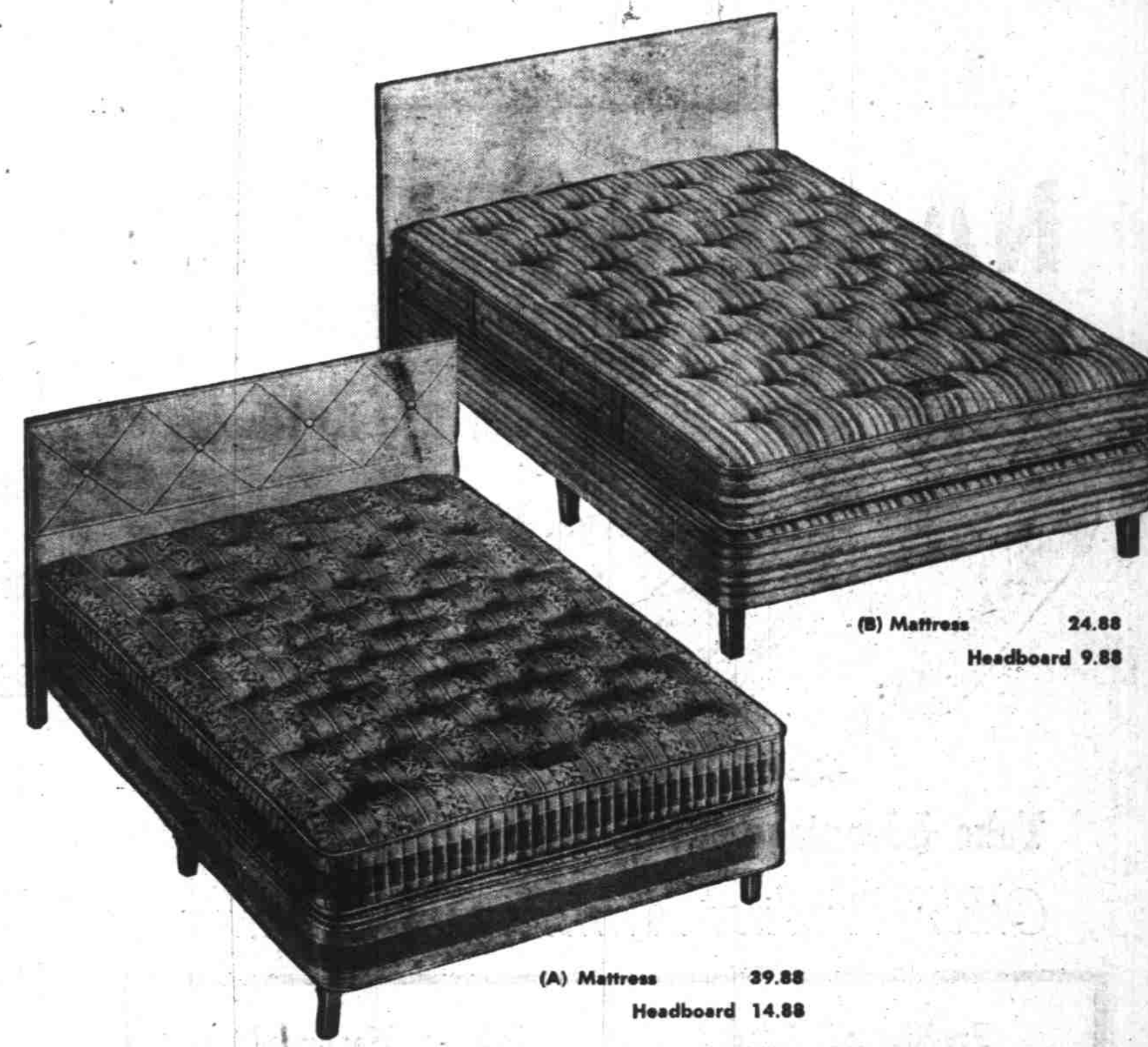
