Gruelling Bout It was a gruelling match all the way with Layne bulling La Starza in the early stages, raking his head with heavy right handed fire and digging solid right hands to the body.

La Starza almost went down in the first minute of action from a right hand shot to the jaw, but he sagged into the ropes and clutched.

The win boosted La Starza's chances of getting a title shot with Marciano, if Rocky still is the champ after April 10. Roland lost a disputed split decision to the Brockton, Mass., blockbuster back in 1950 when both were unbeaten

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






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
