Little Cakes

Pancakes in Variety Interesting Food for Morning, Evening Eating

Pancakes—just something to eat at breakfast time with sugars to some people, make more interesting eating when varied a little. Looking up recipes for pancakes in other than the regular forms, we find a number of novel ones. A baked pancake sounds interesting—it's a different sort of cake when cooked this way:

BAKED PANCAKES
3 beaten eggs 1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sugar 1 quart milk
1/2 cup flour 1 teaspoon anise seed
Bake in a moderate oven with both burners on. Rice goes into these pancakes.

RICE PANCAKES
1 cup warm boiled rice 2 tablespoons melted butter
1 cup milk 4 tablespoons flour
2 eggs 2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
Combine rice, salt, milk, butter and egg yolks. Stir in sifted flour and baking powder. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake on hot greased griddle. Yield: 28 3-inch cakes.
Bananas give another novel turn to the pancakes.

BANANA PANCAKES
2 cups flour 3 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup cornmeal 1/4 cup melted fat
1 tablespoon sugar 3 eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt 2 or 3 bananas, sliced
Sift dry ingredients together three times. Melt fat without heating any more than necessary. Combine ingredients and stir well, add bananas last. Fry as any pancakes.
Here they make a main dish for informal supper menu:

SUPPER PANCAKES
2 eggs 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
2 1/2 cups milk 1/2 cup melted fat
2 cups flour 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
2 tablespoons baking powder 1 cup bran
18 thin slices boiled ham or cheese

Beat eggs; add milk and mix well. Sift flour with baking powder, salt and mustard; add to first mixture, stirring until flour disappears. Add melted and cooled fat and bran. Dip ham or cheese slices in batter, bake on hot griddle, turning over once. Yield: 15 cakes (5 1/2 inches in diameter).
