Budget Cuts Considered By Committee

Budget economies as drastic as eliminating some outlying Salem city fire stations were aired this week as seven budget subcommittees warmed up for a city budget session at 8:30 p.m. Monday in City Hall.

The fire department already was in for considerable discussion, including making first aid service a separate department and asking Salem voters to support it by special millage levy.

Regarding the hints of such fire changes, Fire Chief Ellsworth L. Smith declared flatly Friday "I do not recommend reducing any of the present services of the fire department." He said abandoning any outlying fire station would be detrimental to fast firefighting service and probably would result in higher insurance rates.

The city budget committee headed by Alderman Daniel J. Fry now has under scrutiny City Manager J. L. Franzen's \$2,500,000 budget draft which is in balance but has left for the committee to determine such items as salary raises, emergency fund and several special projects.

The budget meeting will follow the regular City Council session at 7:30 p.m. when a light agenda is expected.

A tighter policy of commercial driveways will be proposed in administration amendments to a similar tightening bill brought in recently by Alderman Thomas Armstrong. Aim is to increase parking area by eliminating some obsolete driveways in the business area.

State Unable To Sign Away Domain Rights

The state can't sign away its right of eminent domain but can give First Presbyterian Church of Salem virtual assurance of remaining on its present location for a half century, the State Board of Controll agreed Friday.

Gov. Paul Patterson said the attorney general had ruled that neither the board nor the Legislature can contract with the church to guarantee such a program, thus denying itself the right to expand by condemnation if necessary in the future.

The board and legislators attending its meeting were of the opinion that the state's plan to assure the church's occupancy and expansion rights should be made a matter of record to discourage future Legislatures from reversing it.

The church will open negotiations for two houses just north of its property on Winter Street. It was expected that the Legislature will be given a proposal allowing the state to sell the church two properties already acquired on Center Street. This would be required unless the lots were sold by bid.

Another house on Center Street also will be sought by the state or church, since the latter would be sole occupant of this block in the mall and would be required to cooperate with the Capitol Planning Commission in keeping its appearance up to that of state properties.

Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry's earlier suggestion that the state buy the church building and make necessary changes for office use, "for a new building will be needed very shortly," was passed up by Friday's decision.

He said it would have provided more than 12,000 feet of usable space with a \$22,000 annual rental, replacing some dwellings now in use for offices.

Although Robert W. Sawyer, chairman of the planning commission, was unable to attend yesterday's session, he wrote that the plan of letting the church remain and expand was consistent with the commission's original and continuing program for mall development. This was planned because "this is a fine building, architecturally worthy, and its presence will not detract from the appearance or setting of the state buildings."

Rupert Magee Rites Friday

Funeral services were held Friday for Rupert S. Magee, 52, who died Thursday at a local hospital following a year's illness.

Magee was born in Nixon, Tex., in 1901 and lived nearly all his life in that state. He came to Salem nine years ago from Corpus Christi, Tex., where he had operated a cleaning establishment.

In Salem he was a carpenter. He was a member of the Carpenters Union, Salem Local, and of the Salem Eagles Lodge.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Alice E. Magee of Salem; sons Pat with the U. S. Army and Ronny of Salem; daughter, Virginia Fulwider of San Francisco; niece, Mrs. Wilmalee Phagans of Salem, and a brother and sister in Texas.

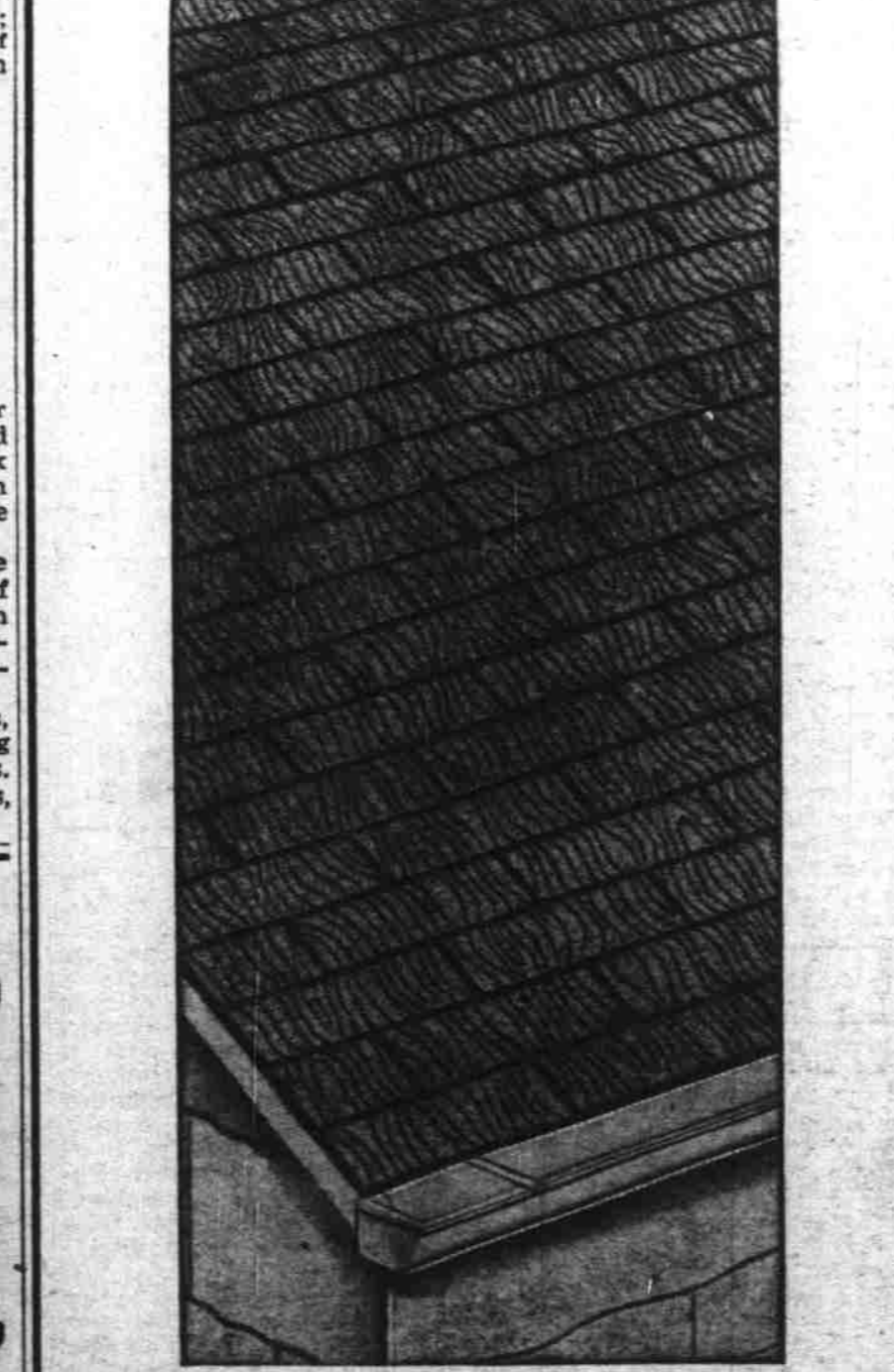
Rockford lived nearly all his life in Nebraska coming to Dallas in 1948. He was retired and lived with his sons in Dallas.

Grand Jury to Probe Douglas County Death

The slaying of C. D. Burgoyne, Riddle area farmer on Feb. 1 by a group of 14 police officers, will be investigated by a Douglas County grand jury, Gov. Paul Patterson announced Friday following a conference with Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton.

The officers contend they shot Burgoyne when he resisted arrest on a charge of threatening a neighbor.

The investigation originally was requested by a "Douglas County Committee for Justice," composed largely of Southern Douglas County residents. They appeared before Gov. Patterson and the attorney general here three weeks ago and charged that Burgoyne's slaying apparently was not justified.

Spokesmen at the conference said Burgoyne could have been arrested with the use of tear gas or sending some trusted neighbor into his cabin.

Gov. Patterson said the attorney general found in his own investigation sufficient facts to warrant the grand jury investigation.

Both Thornton and the governor said the Douglas County sheriff and district attorney invited a grand jury investigation and had cooperated in the preliminary investigation by the attorney general's office.

County Eyes Engineer for Plans Work

Steps toward employing an engineer yet this fiscal year for preliminary county planning work were approved Friday by Marion County Planning Commission.

Chairman William Merriott of Woodburn appointed a committee headed by Fred Schwab of Mt. Angel to consult with county and city of Salem engineers in regarding to hiring a man.

The hope is to put him to work before July 1 with funds sought from or tentatively advanced by county, city and Salem School District. After July 1, county budget funds are expected to be available.

The employe would begin preparation of maps leading toward a master plan of development for the county, slated for completion by next Jan. 1. He would work under Harry Freeman of Portland, a planning consultant.

Lacquer Fires Hit Two Firms

Lacquer burst into flames at two Salem business establishments Friday, but firemen said damage was minor at both fires.

Fire broke out at the National Battery plant at 570 Patterson St. about 11:40 a. m. in a booth where

batteries are sprayed with lacquer. Firemen said a sprinkler in the booth caused some water damage but damage from fire was slight.

Lacquer being painted on a panel at Major Motors Company's new sales office building at 400 N. Liberty St. ignited when it came in contact with an electric wall outlet about 3:45 p. m.

The flames flashed up the walls and charred some of the paneling, said firemen.
