Indians Upset in Overtime 75-71: Axemen Dallas 64-52; Cleveland Ousts Viks

MARSHFIELD COURT, Eugene — (Special) — Marshfield's Pirates and the Eugene Axemen Friday night roared into the finals of the 35th annual State Class A Prep basketball tournament as they turned back the bids of the favored The Dalles Indians and the Dallas Dragons in exciting semi-finals action.

Marshfield rolled to a suspense-filled 75-71 overtime victory that produced the first setback for The Dalles in 27 games this season. Eugene snared a 64-52 decision over a Dallas quint that had loomed as possibly the real darkhorse of this tourney.

Marshfield and Eugene will clash at 8:45 Saturday night for the crown, with Dallas and The Dalles battling at 7:30 for third place honors.

Salem's Vikings came to the end of the tournament trail Friday afternoon as they dropped a tight and thrilling 55-53 game to the Cleveland Indians of Portland. Cleveland tangled at 2:45 Saturday afternoon with Central Catholic for fourth place, the Catholic crew staying in the whirl by dispatching the Albany Bulldogs in two overtimes by a 67-65 count.

The fight for fifth place at 1:30 Saturday involves Clatskanie and Hillsboro. Clatskanie moved up in the consolation bracket with a 68-51 victory at the expense of Medford Friday morning, while Hillsboro dumped Astoria 44-34.

Bob Olson hit one from the side to put Dallas ahead in the opening seconds of the semi-final clash with Eugene. But Don Robinson scored for the Axemen a moment later. Wendy Raser's basket put Eugene ahead 6-4 and they never relinquished the lead.

Dallas was trailing 18-11 at the end of the first quarter and 33-24 at the half.

Eugene held its longest lead of the game, 53-29, during the third quarter.

Then, playing mostly with substitutes, Eugene was held scoreless for the first five minutes of the fourth quarter and Dallas cut the lead to 56-48. But Eugene wasn't actually threatened and went on to win easily.

Norm Willoughby, Eugene center, was high scorer with 18 and Forward George Curtis, led the losers with 12.

The Dalles and Marshfield, No. 1 and No. 2 respectively in the Associated Press poll, fought it out almost point for point before a capacity crowd of 7,500.

The spread was never wider than five points and ties were frequent.

Dave Jones' basket in the last five seconds of the tight second quarter gave The Dalles a 26-24 margin at the half.

Lead switches

A one point lead changed hands five times during the third period but Marshfield was leading 52-50 as the quarter ended.

After 6 1/2 minutes of play in the final quarter, Marshfield had extended its lead to five points, 65-50. Then The Dalles rallied and Dick Haynes' tpin put his team ahead 67-65. Dave Jones sank one for Marshfield to throw the game into overtime.

After 55 seconds of overtime the score was tied again, this time at 67-67, with Stan Lewis and Tom Crabtree scoring for Marshfield and Jones and Haynes for The Dalles.

The Dalles missed two free throws and Marshfield went ahead on a hit by Powers and iced the game with two free throws by Stan Lewis.

The Salem-Cleveland game was always close with the lead sawing continually—and it was a pair of free throws by the Portlanders' Ron Nenow in the last seconds which brought the winning margin as a 53-53 tie was broken.

The teams were knotted 14-14 at the end of the first period and Cleveland held a bare 25-24 margin at the intermission. Harold Hauk's Salems, led by Tom Pickens and Dave Johnson, then moved into a 40-39 advantage as the third quarter reached an end. Nenow led with 13 points in the first period to provide the spark which pulled Cleveland through.

Nenow had 23 points to lead the scoring, while Johnson's 12 was tops for the Viks. Salem played the game minus Reserves Bob Walker and Jack Cobb, dropped off the roster for disciplinary reasons.

Portland's Central Catholic and Albany battled neck and neck in a double-overtime thriller before Central finally won, 67-65. Central Forward Joe Oreskovich was the hero in this one. Standing undefeated under the basket, he scored a layup for the winning points after one minute 50 seconds of the second sudden-death overtime period.

Albany never was ahead but the score twice was tied before Central went into a 20-14 first quarter lead, mostly on baskets by Phil McHugh. Albany moved to within one point in the second period but Central pulled ahead for a 34-26 halftime lead.

The Rams went ahead by eight in the first four minutes of the last quarter, but Albany gradually cut the lead. With 40 seconds left, Albany's Dave Shelby hit two free throws and the 59-59 tie put the game into overtime.

Don Gottfried scored for Central but Shelby put in two more free throws to match. Then Oreskovich and Neil Murphy each got a free throw to make it 63-61 but Frank Burford hit a long shot to tie the game. McHugh and Albany's Lou Hall matched field goals for a 65-65 tie at the first overtime ended.

Hillsboro had a fairly easy time against Astoria. The Spartans took an early lead and stayed in front all the way. It was 21-14 for Hillsboro at the half. Astoria rallied in the fourth period but Hillsboro turned the challenge.

Clatskanie pulled ahead of Medford to stay early in the first quarter. Good shooting by Gordon Fahlgren and Max McCroskey gave Clatskanie a 42-30 lead at the half.

The Tigers increased their margin in the second half and coasted through.

Grover Cleveland Alexander pitched four one-hitters during the 1915 season. This is a record that has never been topped.

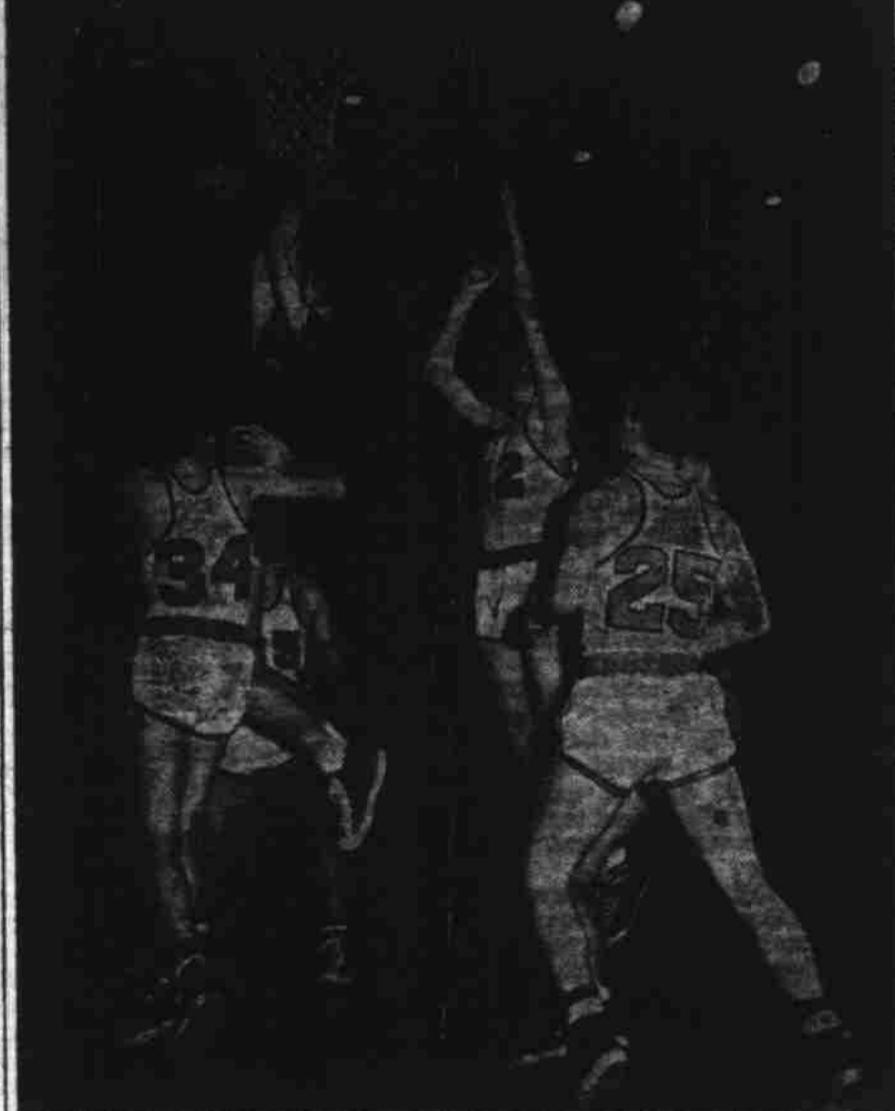

Senator Introduces Bill . . .

Minors' Battle Against Major 'Casts Gets Help

WASHINGTON (D-Colo) — Sen. Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo) Friday introduced a bill aimed at helping baseball's minor leagues stop network telecasts and broadcasts of major league games in their areas.

Johnson, president of the Western League and long a spokesman for the minor circuits, told the Senate that without such legislation "we are through."

Johnson's bill would legalize the re-adoption of a baseball rule in existence before 1948.

This rule provided that no major league club could authorize broadcasts or telecasts of its games within the home territory of a minor league club unless the latter consented. Home territory was defined as the area within 50 miles of the minor league club's park.

Johnson said the rule was repealed in 1949 because the Anti-Trust Division of the Justice Department called in baseball executives and told them it violated the anti-trust laws.

He declared that as a result, the government is fostering a "ruinous policy of destroying the minor leagues by the continual invasion of minor league territory by the majors through radio and TV."

Since that ruling by the Justice Department, he said, the number of minor leagues has dropped by 20, from 59 to 39.

Spokane Obtains Slugging Hafey

SPOKANE (AP) — Will Hafey, home run king of the Western International Baseball League in 1951, has signed with the Spokane Indians for the coming season.

He led the league with 24 homers while playing with Wenatchee two years ago. Hafey was with the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League during part of last season. He's an outfielder.

Yugoslavs Brave Russ Territory for Tourney

LONDON (AP) — Five Yugoslav table tennis players rattled through hostile Rumania in a closed truck Friday night, enroute to Bucharest and the world championships.

This was the word from the Belgrade Radio, which said the determined Yugoslavs will be the first sportsmen from their country to take part in an athletic tournament in a Cominform country, since Yugoslavia broke with Russia in 1948. That is they will be "if all fares well."

Suggs Nabs Lead In Gals Tourney

SPARTANBURG, S. C. (AP) — Louise Suggs ripped the Spartanburg Country Club Course apart with a three-under-par 68 Friday to take the first round lead in the first annual Peach Blossom-Betsy Rawls Invitation Golf Tournament.

Playing in ideal weather, Miss Suggs put together a pair of 94's to finish the first lap of the 54-hole tourney a stroke ahead of Betsy Rawls and Jackie Pung.

Ski Action Delayed

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP) — One event of the Harriman Cup Ski Races was postponed Friday when an unseasonable snowfall dumped about a foot of fresh snow on Baldy Mountain, site of the downhill races.

The slalom will be run as scheduled Sunday on Ruud Mountain, but the downhill event was set back from Saturday to Monday.

DENVER (AP) — Johnny Arndt popped the points in from outside and George Yardley tipped them in from inside as the Los Alamitos, Calif. Naval Flyers shot down Eugene, Ore., 56-49, Friday night in the semi-finals of the 46th National A. A. U. Basketball Tournament.

World Boxing Body Planned

LONDON (AP) — J. Onslow Fane, attorney, diplomat, Etonian, English gentleman and one of the smoothest negotiators in the rugged fight game—is almost a certainty to head a proposed world boxing organization.

The Associated Press learned Friday from an authoritative source that Fane not only is almost a sure thing to become chairman of the new International Boxing Board No. 3, but that London most likely will become the first world capital of boxing.

Other members of the four-man board, whose formation is nearly complete, will be Robert Christenberry of the New York State Athletic Commission, E. Rubert of Paris and an official of the American National Boxing Association (NBA).

The international group will be designed to control tightly all world championships and lines of succession to the titles. There will be no attempt to give the group powers over boxing affairs in various countries other than in the championship phase.

Fane, Christenberry, and Rubert are scheduled to hold the organizational meeting in Paris, May 3.

Peoria Gains Finals

DENVER (AP) — Howie Williams' 85-foot shot from the back court sent the Peoria Diesel Cats sailing to a 67-53 victory over San Diego Friday night in the semi-finals of the National AAU Basketball Tournament.

The victory sends the Illinois Cats into Saturday night's finals against the polished Los Alamitos, with Naval Air Station Club that trampled Eugene, Ore., 56-49, in the other semi-final game.

The San Diego Grimalva Motors team and the Eugene Everybody's Drug five will play for third place.

Peoria, Ill. Diesel Cats and San Diego, Calif., Grimalva Motors. The Eugene team of Oregon collegiate stars suffered from the absence of their six foot seven inch center, Chet Noe, who was confined to his hotel bed with a 103-degree temperature.

After falling 12 points behind late in the third quarter, Eugene rallied in the early minutes of the fourth quarter to win by a margin at 40-46, but the Oregonians could not come any closer the rest of the way.

Eugene was cold at the start and dropped back, 15-5, at the end of the first quarter. The Oregonians' only field goals that period were by three shot men of Mal Streeter. Free set shots by Arndt were the big blows in the first quarter for the flyers.

Yardley and Hal Uplinger ran the margin to 23-13 before Jim Sugrue, Doug Talbot and Jack McElravy pulled the Oregon team within four points at 24-29 — the closest the Eugene five came to going ahead.

Sowers, who found the range on jump shots about 20 feet out, topped the Oregon scoring with 14 points, the same as Al Roges, who topped the Flyers. Yardley and Arndt had 13 each.

Loafing Denied By Angry Dark

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — At an angry press conference Friday Captain Alvin Dark of the New York Giants indignantly denied he had been loafing in exhibition games and had not given his manager, Leo Durocher, full cooperation in the latter's efforts to shift his hard-hitting shortstop to second base.

Dark was told flatly by newsmen that some of them gained the impression he had been dogging it, or at least was playing at something less than his best form.

He conceded that he might not have been giving every play the full treatment, but said that was partly due to the poor diamonds some games had been played on and partly the fact that he was playing himself into condition slowly.

Bratton Stops Oakland Rival

NEW YORK (AP) — Hard-hitting Johnny Bratton of Chicago came from behind Friday night to knock out Bobby Jones of Oakland, Calif., in a 2-2 tie the fifth round of a nationally televised bout at Madison Square Garden. Bratton weighed 149 to Jones' 152.

HAVANA (AP) — Outfielder Ralph Kiner appeared in the Pittsburgh Pirate lineup for the first time in the exhibition season Friday night but his two hits in four times at bat were wasted as the Pirates dropped a 5-3 decision to the Cuban Stars.

Noe Left in Lurch by Snafu

EUGENE (AP) — It was all a misunderstanding, and former University of Oregon basketball star Chet Noe won't play in the East-West college all-star game after all.

That word was received Thursday by Oregon Coach Bill Borchert, who played the news to Noe in Denver Friday morning. Noe, a standout center, is playing for Everybody's Drugs, the Eugene entry in the national AAU tournament at Denver. He was to have gone from there to New York to work out for the East-West game, scheduled March 28.

Last month Noe received a telegram from Irving Marsh of the New York Herald Tribune, sponsor of the all-star game. Noe replied that he was interested in playing.

Borchert said that late Thursday, another wire from Marsh explained the original query was only a feeler and that enough centers already had been contacted.

It appears that Noe, who also played the shot, will be able to compete in track for Oregon this spring. Before he received the East-West feeler, Noe planned not to play in any post-season basketball tournaments.

But when he received the first telegram from Marsh, he decided to join the Eugene AAU club for the Denver tourney. That means he will be ineligible for track competition under Pacific Coast Conference rules.

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
