## Waterworks Officials Visit New Reservoir

About 75 waterworks officials from numerous Oregon cities are visiting the Salem city reservoir at Turner Hill this week in connection with an annual waterworks instruction course on the Oregon State College campus.

John Geren, Salem water manager, is conducting a group of 25 to the reservoir on each of the three days of the school, Monday through Wednesday.

Also helping in instruction in laboratory technique is Engineer Frank Morse of the Salem water department. James Gardner, general foreman here, also is attending the course.

The three-day school is sponsored by OSC, the State Board of Health and the American Waterworks Association.

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## Klamath River Commission Bill Passes

Without a dissenting vote, the Senate Monday passed and sent to the governor a bill creating a Klamath River Commission.

It will work out a compact with California for distribution of water in the Klamath Basin. The five-man commission would include one member from Jackson County and four from Klamath County. The Senate also sent to the governor a \$25,000 appropriation for the commission.

A bill to make operators of roadside zoos get permits from the State Game Commission was defeated by the Senate Monday 18 to 10.

A bill to remove the requirement that fishing poles and lines must be held in the hand at all times was passed by the Senate Monday and sent to the governor.

## Trust Forum to Make Sample Estate Plan

A sample estate plan will be worked out during a trust forum sponsored by the U. S. National Bank at 7:30 tonight in the Mirror room of the Marion Hotel. Rex Gibson, vice president and manager of the bank's Ladd & Bush-Salem branch, will preside.

A team of three trust officers from the bank's Portland office, will conduct the public program, slated to be a non-technical discussion of everyday estate problems.

## Indians Ask Patterson to Help Halt Dam

The Dalles dam across the Columbia River, now under construction, is a federal project and not one in which either the states of Washington or Oregon has any control. Gov. Paul Patterson told two Indian chiefs who appeared Monday in hope of soliciting aid in halting the construction.

The chiefs were Watson Totus and Wilson Charley, both from the Yamkina tribe. They said construction of the dam at The Dalles would flood the Celilo Falls area to a depth of 40 feet and was in violation of a treaty executed between the Northwest Indians and the federal government in 1855. Charley said that the dam construction in addition to destroying the beauty of the Celilo Falls area, would deprive a large number of Indians of their fishing rights.

## Measure Would Tax City-Owned Electric Firms

City-owned electric companies would be taxed on operations outside of their cities under a bill introduced in the House Monday. Authors of the bill are Rep. Loran L. Stewart, Cottage Grove, and Sen. Angus L. Gibson, Junction City. They said they introduced it at the request of school district 19 of Lane County.
