#### Buying for Your Home

Dish Rack Makes Draining More Efficient, Eight Large Loop Holders

There was a time when women felt gaily about allowing the dishes to drain dry. Not so, in these servantless days! Air-drying the dishes is using good sense to cut a corner, not laziness.

A new rubber-cushioned dish-drainer makes this method of handling a once annoying job even more efficient.

The new drainer has eight large loop holders at the side to support glasses. You don't have to worry about chipping.

It has a plastic cup in one corner, in which silverware may be drained upright. This makes good sense. The plastic cup may be removed and carried over to

the silver drawer.

(Q) "I live in an old house and my kitchen has an unpleasantly high beamed ceiling. What can I do to make it look better?"

(A) That high, beamed ceiling sounds beautiful! You probably have the beginnings of a very attractive room. Paint the ceiling a darker color than your walls to bring it down a bit. Leave the beams natural if possible. If they must be painted, use black or brown. If you want to be really daring, use wallpaper in a bold, colorful pattern on the ceiling. Use gay, cottage-like furnishings to carry out the rustic theme set by the beams.
