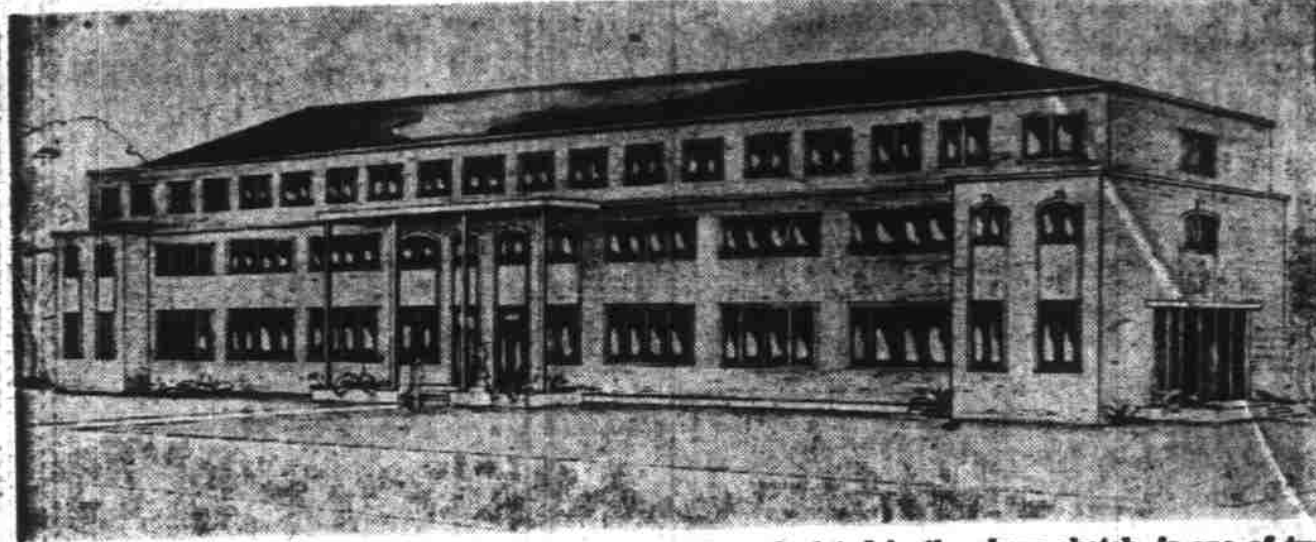


Women's Dorm Part of Big Building Program

Willamette to Begin Building Drive Today

Willamette University will launch its million dollar Challenge Fund for new buildings at a luncheon today at 12:15, President G. Herbert Smith announced Wednesday.

to raise \$200,000 in Salem. Speaking before some 30 businessmen, alumni and friends of the university will be Truman Collins, co-chairman of the national program; Charles E. McCulloch, president of the board of trustees, and Robert Notson, chairman of the Portland campaign. All are from Portland.

Authorization of a financial campaign for \$1,000,000 to construct a new fine arts building and auditorium and a women's dormitory, was voted by the university trustees in February. Construction of the new buildings will be the first step in a \$5,000,000 long-range program. They will be the first units in a new quadrangle of buildings on

the old Sweetland athletic field. The university has been promised a contingent gift of \$250,000 toward the project. The anonymous donor has stipulated that both buildings must rise at the same time and the gift will be effective when the university has raised at least another \$400,000.

The new university structures will be of modern concrete and brick construction and will provide the latest in auditorium, fine arts, drama, speech and radio classrooms and dormitory space. In the past five years, the amount of feed needed to produce a three-pound broiler has been reduced from 10 1/2 pounds to about 9 pounds.
