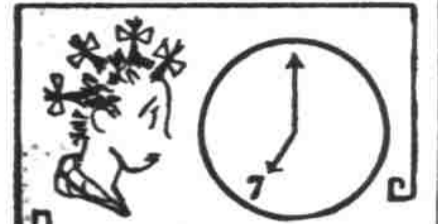

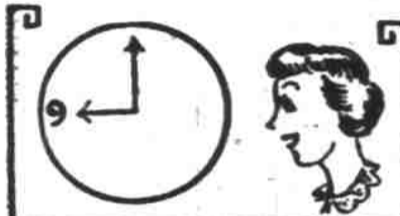

Born June 17, 1883 in Fort Dodge, Iowa, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Summers, the deceased lived near Missoula and Kallispell, Mont., for several years, farming and doing carpentry work.

He came to Portland in 1942 where he did defense work and moved to Salem five years ago and operated a service station at 12th and State Streets. He was a former member of the Moose Lodge in Kallispell, Mont.

County Budget To Permit 3½ Staff Additions

Three and one-half persons could be added to the Marion County payroll next fiscal year as a result of grants made Wednesday by the budget committee.

It authorized another deputy county clerk, a jailer (already on duty but not on the current budget), a relief man in the sheriff's office and a part-time District Court bailiff.

The committee approved \$12,000 for county planning and zoning, compared to \$16,275 asked, and \$3,000 for a veterans' memorial building at Aurora.

The health department was granted \$53,458 by the county, out of a total budget of \$134,400, cut by \$540. This places the appropriation increase at just under 6 per cent. The health revenues' estimate was upped by \$4,568 to \$80,942.

Welfare got \$293,838, as allotted by the state. Anticipated needs of roads are \$678,000 to be

offset by revenues other than taxes.

Increased revenues of substantial amounts were expected from O&C land grant taxes, tax payments for prior years, forest rentals and sales, road fines, liquor allotments for old age assistance, Woodburn justice court and gasoline taxes.

For the first time, the committee could set elected officials' salaries, heretofore done by the Legislature. For the coming year, those are to be \$5,820 for clerk, \$5,280 for county judge and sheriff, \$4,980 for assessor, commissioners, recorder, school superintendent, surveyor and treasurer, \$4,080 for Salem constable.
