Home Made Mixes Open Vistas of Adventures in Baking Recipes

One of the shortening manufacturers has put out a handy booklet on what to do with home-made mixes and we can't resist giving you a pretty thorough review of the pamphlet, though the poor manufacturer must remain anonymous . . .

HOT BREAD MIX
6 cups sifted flour
1 tablespoon salt
3 tablespoons baking powder
1 cup shortening
Cut shortening into sifted dry ingredients until mixture looks like coarse cornmeal. Store in covered container, no refrigeration is needed . . .

SUGAR AND SPICE BREAD
2½ cups hot bread mix
¾ cup milk
½ cup sugar
1 egg
Combine sugar and mix, add milk and lightly beaten egg which have been mixed together. Mix until smooth. Pour in 8x8 greased pan. Sprinkle with a crumbled mixture of ¼ cup brown sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon and 1 tablespoon shortening. Bake at 400 degrees for about 25 minutes . . .

WAFFLES
2 cups hot bread mix
2 tablespoons sugar
Combine mix and the sugar. Beat eggs and milk. Combine but do not attempt to remove lumps. Bake as usual . . .

MUFFINS
2 cups hot bread mix
2 tablespoons sugar
Combine as for waffles, mixing only until well moistened. Bake at 400 degrees 20 to 25 minutes . . .

PIE-COOKIE MIX
6 cups flour
1 pound (2½ cups) shortening
Cut together with pastry blender or two knives until pieces are size of peas. Store covered . . .

SUGAR COOKIES
Stir together 2 cups mix, add ¾ cup sugar, 1 teaspoon baking powder. Blend in 1 egg and drop by spoonful into a mixture of 2 tablespoons sugar and 2 teaspoons cinnamon in a bowl. Shake bowl to coat. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes. If you want to roll them out, add ¼ cup flour in first step . . .

HOT BREAD MIX
6 cups sifted flour
