## Listen to This

### High Fidelity Enthusiast Finds Music Approaches True Perfection

We have had in mind a story about high fidelity for some time, and now Life Magazine comes out this week with a feature about a strange breed of individual who goes wild over sound. This creature was to have been part of the subject matter of our story.

High fidelity, we are told, can be perfectly sane, though it is not always so. It is, as we understand it, the reproduction of music or speech in a manner to be startlingly like the original. Though reproduction of sound at its best is only a compromise, high fidelity engineers are approaching perfection. By extending the range of the sound cycles up and down, by eliminating much of the mechanics employed by audio engineers in regular recordings this near-perfection is being accomplished.

Though causing rising of temperature and blood pressure of some listeners who are always going wild on some subject, high fidelity also attracts many persons honestly interested in better music.

#### ONE NOTE COUNTS

While some hi-fi bugs will listen through a complete record only to scream approval at the clashing of one cymbal or the dull thud of a single note on the drums, most of the listeners to high fidelity recordings do so for the sheer pleasure of hearing well balanced, brilliantly reproduced harmonics.

High fidelity sound is only to be obtained by playing especially recorded disks on high fidelity equipment. A number of companies record high fidelity music under special labels one or two devoting their entire facilities to its production.

All dealers do not carry the special equipment for the high fidelity listening, though it is available in this area. It is to be noted, however, that high fidelity recordings will do no good without the proper equipment. The record players of 95 per cent of the people who listen to good music will not record the brilliancy of the high fidelity recordings and the music may not sound even as good as that on the ordinary good records.

#### SANE AND HOT

If you are interested in music and have sincere wish to enjoy the very best possible reproductions of sound, or are on the lookout for something to go slightly awry about, you might look to high fidelity.

Recording companies are doing a good job of turning out records of excellence even without the use of high fidelity techniques, but if you are going to go into this highly specialized reproduction of sound, think carefully and listen attentively. High fidelity does not consist entirely of high frequencies, there must be good balance. You will be investing a good deal of money in this new sound experience, where the difference of a few cycles means so much, so make your choice of equipment with wisdom and caution.
