Land Bureau Sets Timber Sale Monday

A relatively small timber auction, of only 1 1/2 million board feet, is slated for 10 a. m. Monday by the Salem District office, U. S. Bureau of Land Management.

Total appraisal is \$30,067, according to G. F. Horne, acting district forester. The tracts from which timber will be sold by oral auction are north of Sheridan in Yamhill County, 465,000 feet of seed trees left in earlier logging; near Quartzville in Linn County, 225,000 feet of salvage from earlier logging; near Green Peak in Benton County, 725,000 feet of wind-thrown timber, to prevent spread of bark beetle infestation.

Sealed bids will be received for 160,000 feet of old growth salvage in Clackamas County.

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Valley Towns Postmaster's Jobs Sought

WASHINGTON—Six Rickreall citizens and eight Brownsville residents have jumped into competition for the postmasterships of those towns, according to the Civil Service Commission.

The commission plans to conduct written exams within the next two to three weeks at a time and place not yet determined. The three highest applicants, rated by their exam scores, will be ruled eligible for the appointment. Their names will be sent to Rep. Walter Norblad for his recommendation to the president in selection of one person to serve as permanent postmaster.

The contenders for the \$3,509 Rickreall post are Kenneth N. Lucas, Grace I. Willis, Cecil W. Peltier, Kenneth C. Farrens, Richard V. Carleson and Charles A. Lowe.

The Brownsville postmaster's position, carrying a salary of \$4,470, presumably will go to one of the following applicants: Gwendolyn R. Samuelson, Ralph H. Dannen, Myrtle M. Giles, Donald M. Craw, Lauree E. Ottinger, Louis J. Walker Jr., James V. Shepherd and Raymond E. Page.

The Rickreall and Brownsville postal vacancies are the first in the Salem area to be filled by the new Republican administration.

Santiam Area Water Control Okeh Awaited

Marion County Court Friday said it would announce soon its decision on whether to permit formation of a Santiam Water Control District.

The court made its announcement following a hearing on the matter. A group, including individuals and several attorneys representing landowners, discussed the formation of the district with the court Friday morning.

"If the court decides to accept the boundaries of the district and to allow formation of the district, then a final hearing date will be set," said County Judge Rex Hartley.

"If, prior to the final hearing, owners of 20 per cent of the acreage in the proposed district petition for an election, then the court must call for one. However, if no election is asked for, the court may, at the final hearing, approve formation of the district."

The petitions for the district ask for a water control, drainage and irrigation district lying south and east of Salem.

Schomus Rite Slated Today In Portland

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Ann Schomus, formerly of Shaw and Gervais, will be held at 10 o'clock this morning at St. Rita's Catholic Church in Portland.

Mrs. Schomus died Wednesday, after a six-week illness at the home of a daughter, Mary H. Schomus of Portland, where she had lived since 1944.

Mary Ann Feely was born June 26, 1873, at Springfield, Ill., the daughter of Irish immigrants, and came to Astoria as a small girl. She was the first telephone operator in Astoria.

She was married to Joseph Schomus in 1905 at McMinnville. They owned the general store at Shaw for a few years then farmed in the Gervais-St. Paul area for 14 years. She moved to Portland after her husband's death.

Other survivors are three sons, Cyril of Woodburn, Ronald and Francis of Salem, and 10 grandchildren.

Rosary recitation was Friday night. Officiating at today's rites will be two nephews, the Rev. Stephen Hoffman of Portland and the Rev. Matthew Butsch of Tillamook. Interment will be at Mt. Calvary Cemetery in Portland. Hennessey, Goetsch and McGee Funeral Home is in charge.

Citizens Ask Morningside Safety Guards

A petition bearing more than 1,000 names Friday asks the Marion County Court to build traffic devices for children in the vicinity of the new Morningside School south of Salem.

Judge Rex Hartley said the court has, for the past several months, "given careful consideration to possible safety measures" on county roads near the new school.

"A survey of the traffic hazards in that area is now underway, conducted by county engineers and officials of the state traffic safety division. Measures necessary for the safety of school children will be considered."

The judge added he was "happy, though, that so many citizens have such an interest in traffic safety measures." He said he hoped residents will continue to consider public issues and to make recommendations.

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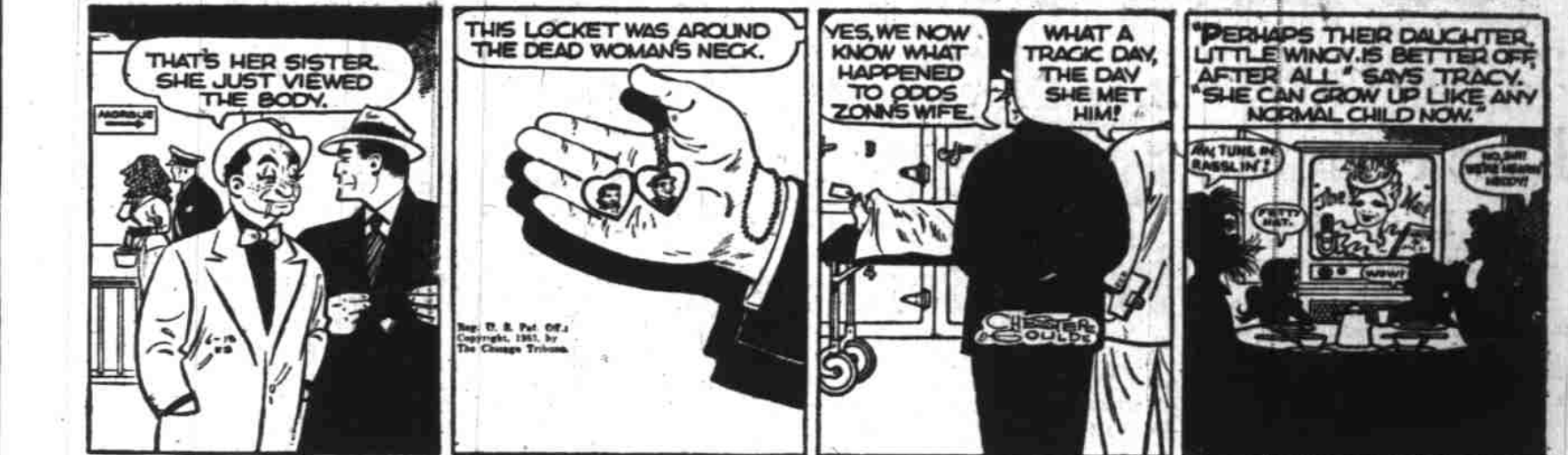
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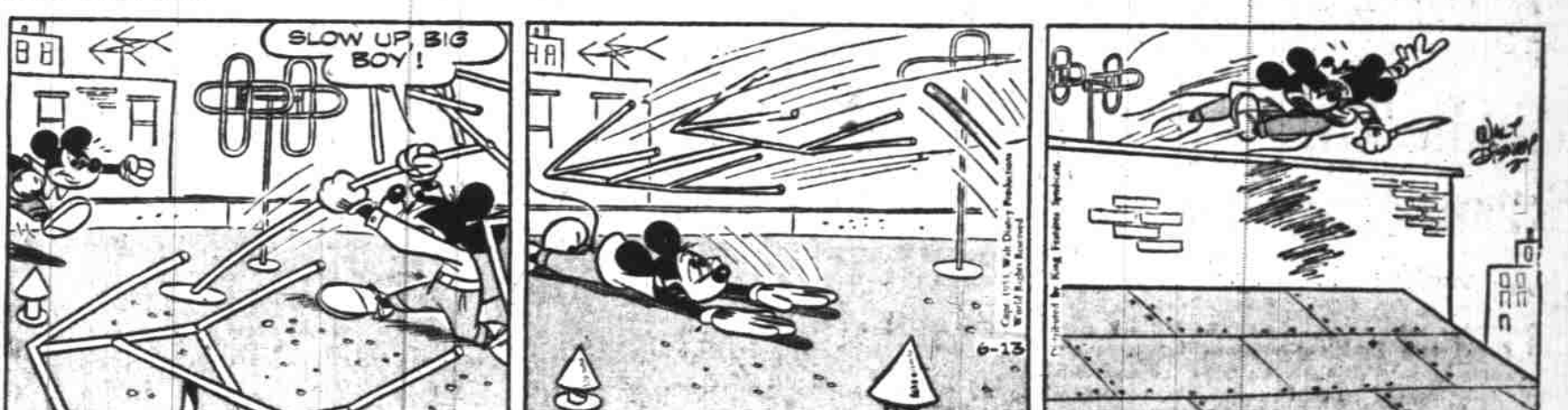
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
