

Wheat Prices Fluctuate During Week

CHICAGO (U) — The wildest wheat price fluctuations in more than four years were touched off this week on the Board of Trade. On Monday, wheat prices fell the full 10 cent a bushel limit, for the first time since Feb. 11, 1949. Wednesday they shot upward the 10 cent limit, for the first time since March 4, 1948. The wheat harvest in the Southwest, and the acute storage situation there and elsewhere in the wheat belt, set off the sharp downturn. Then on Wednesday, the government announced it would grant price support loans to wheat in the Southwest which has to be piled on the ground because of lack of storage facilities. This touched off the 10 cent upturn.

Stock Market Stages Rally

NEW YORK (U) — The stock market tested its lows of the year again this week, then put on its best rally in nearly a month. It closed the week with a small average gain.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks closed the week at \$10.70, up 20 cents over the week before. Its lowest close during the week was \$10.43 on Tuesday, when the market tested the lows.

Most market analysts appeared following all this wild price movement, the wheat market closed Friday with a gain of 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 cents over a week ago Friday. Corn was down 1/4 to 1 1/2, oats 1 1/4 higher to 1/4 lower, rye 1/2 to 1 1/4 lower, soybeans 1 1/2 to 4 1/4 lower, and lard 25 to 60 cents a hundred pounds lower.
