Man Conquers Polio to Obtain Schooling, Job

A victim of polio who went to college in a wheel chair now works as an auditor for the state income tax division.

He is Gordon C. Wells, of Independence, a June graduate of Oregon State College. Two of his Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity brothers, Don Young of Salem and Don Wimer of Albany, wheeled him in the commencement line—all in caps and gowns—but now he gets around by himself with the aid of crutches and his specially-built car.

H. S. Education By Mail

Stricken with polio in 1941 just before he was to enter Independence High School, Wells continued his high school education through correspondence work.

In the spring of 1949 he became an Oregon State College student majoring in business

technology, after aptitude tests and other counselling devices of the Oregon State Vocational Rehabilitation service showed his abilities for that work. The vocational rehabilitation also aided him financially—paying for part of his tuition and student supplies. While on the campus he was a member of Sigma Phi Epsilon social fraternity and the Business and Technology Club.

Finishes in December

He finished his college work in December, 1952, waiting until the regular annual commencement for his diploma, however.

On April 26 he was married to Nina Moon, a hometown girl he had known a long time, and the couple now lives in Independence. Wells commutes to his Salem job, in his car, which is specially equipped with levers for manual driving, but plans to move to the capital soon.

Wells is a native of Independence, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Perry Wells, who own a farm and cherry orchards in Buena Vista. He has one brother, Jack, who recently made news in his own right, when he returned from a six-months 4-H sponsored tour of Bolivia.

Oregon Protests Idaho Power Dams' Failure to Protect Fish

WASHINGTON—The Hells Canyon debate, now going into its second week before the Federal Power Commission here, may be shifted to Salem before the firing ceases from opponents of the Idaho Power Co. plan for building three dams in the Snake River. This was indicated last week in letters received by the FPC and introduced as evidence of opposition to the proposed projects as well.

Fails to Protect Fish

"Idaho Power has not satisfied the requirements of this commission regarding the protection of the fish life which can be completely destroyed by the construction of these projects," FPC was informed by Chairman John C. Veatch of the fish commission.

Veatch charged that the Idaho utility had built dams on the upper Snake "with little or no regard" for salmon runs; and he said Idaho Power had not consulted the fish commission, as is its duty, in regard to its planned projects in and near Hells Canyon.

May Block Permit

Veatch hinted that this would be required by the state before it would entertain a request from Idaho Power for a permit which it must obtain from the Oregon Hydroelectric Commission before it can build its dam.

Asked for a clarification of attempts to get permission of both states adjacent to the Snake River dam sites, T. E. Roach, president of the utility, said: "We have all the permits we need from Idaho, but those fellows over in Oregon won't act until we get approval of the Federal Power Commission."

Oregon's Next Hurdle

If the FPC grants the utility's request for a license, then Idaho Power must go before the Oregon Hydroelectric Commission to get permission of the state. In another controversial private power development, the Pelton Dam proposed by Portland General Electric Co. on the Deschutes River was approved by the FPC only to have the hydroelectric commission deny it permission due to opposition of fishing interests.

Fish damage had heretofore not been considered a major factor in the Hells Canyon case, but Veatch told the FPC he estimated the capitalized value of the sport and commercial stocks in the area above Hells Canyon to be \$20,400,000—which he said is increasing all the time and might be doubled over the years.

Brewery Sale Near Climax

SEATTLE (AP) — Emil G. Sick reported Saturday night his Sicks' Seattle Brewing and Malting Co. and the Hamm Brewing Co., St. Paul, Minn., have all but completed arrangements for the purchase of the Rainier Brewing Co., of California.

Sick said his firm will pay about \$500,000 for the name and goodwill of the California company, thereby acquiring world rights to use the Rainier brand name of beer and ale.

The Hamm company will take over the California Rainier plants and other physical properties for about 2 million dollars. Sick said his brewery will ship beer and ale into California under the Rainier name for the time being, but a 3 1/2 million dollar plant may be built in that state later.

Stockholders of the Rainier company have agreed to sell their holdings to the Sick-Hamm syndicate.

Gen. Chase on Secret Trip

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP) — Maj. Gen. William C. Chase, for two years, U.S. military adviser to the Chinese Nationalists, left Formosa Sunday on a Tokyo-bound commercial airliner, but refused to tell his final destination.

Chase, chief of the U.S. Military Assistance Advisory Group

(MAAG), was accompanied by his wife, who has been in poor health. The general recently denied rumors that his assignment has been terminated.
