Blind to Profit By Dog Show Here Sunday

An all-breed dog show Sunday at the State Fairgrounds will bring 506 show dogs to Salem. Judging will go on from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., open to the public.

The show is sponsored by Salem Lions Club as a benefit for a widely-known non-profit school for the training of guide dogs and the blind persons who use them. This is Guide Dogs for the Blind, Inc., San Rafael, Calif. At funds will come from sale of admission tickets.

Aim of the school corresponds with one of the Lions clubs' major aims — that of helping the blind to support themselves.

The school breeds most of its own stock, confining this program to German shepherds and Labrador retrievers. Two measures are taken to insure that the dogs are trainable as guides. Puppies are tested weekly by volunteers for five consecutive times, beginning at eight weeks; those not measuring up in intelligence and temperament are discarded.

At the age of three months selected puppies are placed in foster homes — chiefly among 4-H Club members. At the age of one year, they are returned to the school and given three months of intensive training before they are teamed with the blind students for another month of education together.

A 15-year-old Salem boy was arrested on a larceny charge by city detectives Monday and admitted in a signed statement stealing eight cases of beer April 21 from a beer truck.

The boy told police that he and another youth—who was arrested June 2—broke into the truck at the Richfield Service Station, Front and Center Streets.

After failing to force locks on three or four trucks parked there they found one unlocked.

The boys said they hid the beer in the bushes and returned for it the next morning, taking it up the river and caching it in a cave. They returned several times to drink it, the youth stated.

He was released to his grandfather and cited to appear in juvenile court today.

Forest Station Bid Awarded

Dean Johnson, Inc., McMinnville, was awarded contract for aerial transport of 21,500 pounds of building materials for construction of the Saddle Mountain Lookout in Clatsop County. Wendell Ewing, purchasing agent for the State Forestry Department, announced Monday.

Johnson's bid for the air lift was 11 cents per pound. He indicated that he might use two helicopters on the airlift, which is scheduled to begin not later than July 20, weather permitting.

Ewing said the "whirly birds" will transport 12,600 pounds of cement, gravel and building block to the 3,283 foot observation point where the lookout house will be put together.
