

Pitchers Take C League Limelight

SeRine Hurls 1-Hit Beauty

Jewelers Edge Steinke's Nine

A pitchers' due, and a one-hit performance by Dave SeRine featured Monday night's action in the Salem Class C baseball league.

SeRine pitched and batted his Legion Post 136 club to an 8-0 victory over Steinke's in a scoreless encounter at Barrick Field. The young hurler rapped out a single and triple and drove in four of his team's eight runs in addition to blanking the opposition on a lone single to Steve Stewart in the first inning. He struck out six and walked seven.

Bud Chappelle and Gene Gilbertson tied in the duel with Chappelle getting the best of a 3-2 count for his Jackson Jeweler nine over Keizer at the Keizer diamond. Chappelle struck out ten and gave up only two hits in the six-inning mix. Successive singles by Brankle and Cross chased in Phil Klaus with the winning run in the bottom of the sixth. Jackson's other two runs were batted in by Sather with a single after Gilbertson had walked two men and watched them advance on a fielders' choice.

The Legion nine bunched all their offensive in the first and second innings to smother Steinke's. In the first inning, Jim Reimann doubled, Val Barnes tripled, SeRine singled and Mike Kelley singled in order. SeRine's triple came in the second as did a three-baser by Rhett Partee. Action shifts tonight to the B leagues where Berg's Market faces Trux Oil on the Keizer diamond and Bishop Electric takes on Salem Laundry at Barrick. C action will resume Wednesday with West Salem Lions vs Orchard Heights at West Salem, and Four Corners vs. Dickson's Market at Leslie.

By CHARLES CHAMBERLAIN CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago White Sox Monday shook off the disappointment of losing a doubleheader to the New York Yankees Sunday and assured their faithful followers that pennant hopes still burn.

"We'll never quit — this team isn't that kind," said Paul Richards, slender, astute manager of the Sox who now trail the world champions by six games after losing 6-2 and 3-0 Sunday.

"October is a long way off," he added thoughtfully. "Those Yankees aren't in yet. We still have a chance. But they're tough — you can't feel safe even after you catch 'em."

"I thought our pitching yesterday (by Mike Forniello and Billy Pierce) was splendid, but we couldn't hit and you can't win unless you do."

Virgil (Fire) Trucks spent several hours at Comiskey Park Monday while the remainder of the team took a rest. He was loosening up his right arm, eager to pitch Tuesday night against the Boston Red Sox who have climbed into third place with a five-game winning streak.

Richest Horse Race at Camden

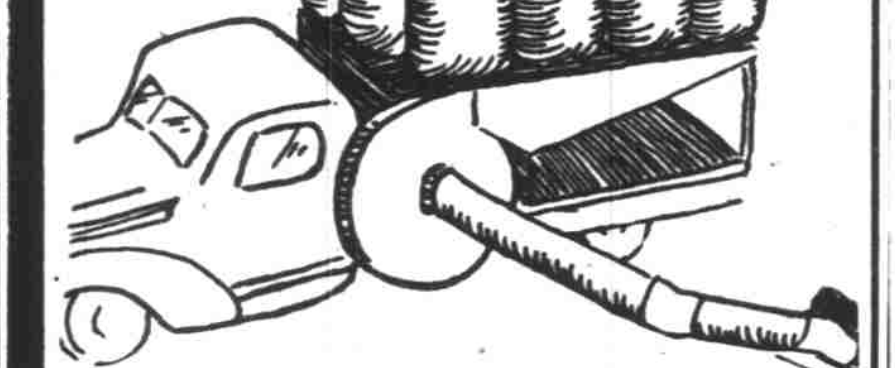
CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) — Officials of Garden State Park announced Monday the Garden State — a mile and a sixteenth run for two-year-olds scheduled Oct. 31 — will be the world's richest horse race with a gross value of \$239,395.

General Manager Walter H. Donovan said the figure may top the \$250,000 mark by the time the race is run.

The previous high mark for a horse race stood at \$205,700, set by the 1951 Santa Anita maturity.
