

Zoners Drop Classification Of 'Neighborhood Business'

A classification of "neighborhood business" was eliminated in practice—except for one instance—and substituted by "restricted business district" during the Wednesday night meeting of the Salem Planning and Zoning Commission.

Only three such classifications (C-1) existed in the city: the four corners of 17th and Market Streets; the southwest corner of 21st and Market Streets, and the northwest corner of North Summer and Gaines Streets. After Wednesday night's action, the only C-1 classification in the city is the Summer Street Grocery at North Summer and Gaines Streets. The other two are now designated C-2.

"Actually the C-1 districts, for the most part, weren't conforming to the building and application specifications," explained City Attorney Chris Kowitz. Property involved was described by members of the commission as too small to be effected by any great change in the immediate future and is presently surrounded by R-1 classifications (single family dwellings). Included in the change to C-2 was a strip of land just east of 17th and Market Streets where a proposed drug store and clinic is planned.

Map Changed Little
The special meeting reconsidered several petitions for individual changes in the planning

and zoning already considered by the commission, but for the most part left the map as it was adjusted Aug. 4.

One change involved property near the Catholic Cemetery at Liberty Road and King Street. It was proposed by the commission to extend the westernmost C-3 (general business district) boundary southerly along a route parallel to Liberty Road—to the city limits—unless the extension proves impractical. If it won't work the matter is to be referred to City Engineer J. Harold Davis.

A strip of land involving seven lots on the north of Mission Street between 16th and 17th Streets was changed from R-4 (restricted residential) to C-3 (general business) at the request of Arch McKillop Real Estate and other signers of a petition.

To Business Zone
A change to a business zone (C-3) from a restricted residential (R-4) was made on the north and south lots of Hines Street running from 13th Street east to the railroad tracks. This was made to accommodate a warehouse located on one of these lots.

Property at 168 N. 12th St. was changed from an R-3 (apartments, hotels, etc.) to a C-3 (general business) at the request of A. E. Danielson.

A 150-foot setback from State Street of a C-3 districting was set by the commission from 25th Street running east to the city limits at the request of Richard Nordorf to accommodate more adequate business zoning there.

Three other petitions placed before the commission by mail were placed on file without action for want of reasonable ground for change. The next regular meeting of the commission will be held at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday.

Ike Delays Water Project Policy Stand

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower passed up the opportunity afforded him at the Seattle conference of governors to make clear the administration's point of view on water resource development because no policy has yet been formulated.

The president made this much clear in a special message to Congress just before the lawmakers adjourned — a message which went virtually unreported at the time because it got swallowed up in the final rush of business on Capitol Hill.

"This administration if moving ahead in the formulation of sound organization and improved policies for the use of our soil, our public lands and our water resources," Eisenhower told Congress. But he went on to say the policies were still in the works.

Review Made
"A review is being made of the basic power policies of the federal government in connection with multiple-purpose river basin development as it relates to private economic development. The Corps of Engineers is making a study of the basis for state and local financial participation in local flood-protection works. There are under detailed study various proposals for dealing with the complicated problems of overlapping and duplicative authority among the several resource-development agencies," the president said.

This explains why, on his first visit to the resource-conscious Pacific Northwest since assuming the presidency, Eisenhower did not spell out the course his administration is charting in this important field.

The special message, Eisenhower said, was for the purpose of having Congress "focus attention on some of our basic land and water resource problems and to point the way for constructive efforts to improve the management of these resources."

Eisenhower recalled that in his state of the union address in January he had "indicated the need for a strong federal program" and "at the same time pointed to the necessity for a cooperative partnership of the states and local communities, private citizens, and the federal government in carrying out a sound natural resource program."

The president went on: "In addition to the immediate danger of waste resulting from inadequate conservation measures, we must bear in mind the needs of a growing population and an expanding economy. At present we are faced with excess reserves of some agricultural commodities and the need for production adjustments to gear our agricultural economy to current demands."

"But in the long run, we shall need to give increased attention to the improvements and reclamation of land in its broadest aspects, including soil productivity, irrigation, drainage, and the replenishing of ground-water reserves, if we are adequately to feed and clothe our people, to provide gainful employment, and to continue to improve our standard of living."

"Our basic problem is to carry forward the tradition of conservation, improvement and wise use and development of our land and water resources—a policy initiated 50 years ago under the leadership of President Theodore Roosevelt.

Cooperation Needed
"To do this within the framework of a sound fiscal policy and in the light of defense needs will require the maximum cooperation among the states and local communities, farmers, businessmen, and other private citizens, and the federal government. It will require the development of clear guidelines to be established by the Congress as to the proper functions of the federal government. It will require adherence to sound principles for the financing and the sharing of the cost of multiple-purpose land and

water resources development. It will require improved federal organization to accomplish a more logical division of responsibilities among the various federal agencies in order that resource development programs may be carried on with the greatest efficiency and the least duplication. And it will require comprehensive river basin planning with cooperation of state and local interests."

Huk Surrender Offer Claimed

MANILA — The Manila Bulletin reported Thursday that three leading Communist Huk dissidents headed by Luis Taruc, had offered to surrender to the Philippine government, but government sources immediately discounted the story.

A Defense Department spokesman said "we don't know anything about it."

The Bulletin, an American-owned daily, quoted "Defense Department sources" as saying the surrender terms were in possession of Acting Defense Secretary Oscar Castelo, who flew to the United States Wednesday on summons of President Elpidio Quirino.

The Bulletin said the Huks, willing to surrender are Taruc, top chief of the dissident hierarchy; Mariano Balgos, who ranks third; and Jose de Leon "Dimasalang," another ranking leader.

Controversy Over Indian Bill Arises

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower Wednesday sent statements for and against a bill that would give five states jurisdiction over Indian crimes and open the way for other states to assume such authority.

Rep. A. L. Miller (R-Neb.), chairman of the House Interior Committee, urged the President to sign the measure.

But Sen. Murray (D-Mont.) joined the ranks of those who have urged veto of the bill, saying Indians in his state are "unanimous" in opposition to the pending measure.

The bill would give civil and criminal jurisdiction over Indian reservations to California, Nebraska, Minnesota (except Red Lake), Oregon (except Warm Springs) and Wisconsin (except Menominee).

Another provision would allow any state to assert authority over Indian crimes. Legislative action would be required in the other states but consent of the tribes affected would not.

Miller and Murray both sent their statements to Eisenhower at Denver, where he is vacationing.

Quake Wipes Out Two Ancient Ionian Cities

ATHENS, Greece — Two Ionian Sea island cities of ancient Greek memory were wiped out Wednesday by a series of nine new earthquakes that rocked and devastated three whole islands.

The destroyed cities were Argostolion, population 10,000, and Zakynthos, 11,315.

Flames in the wake of the quakes that began Sunday consumed what was left of Zakynthos. A member of parliament, Kostas Voultos of Zakynthos, reported the ruin of his home city late Wednesday night in a radiogram from there.

Reports from the three wrecked islands of Ithaca, Kefallinia and

Zakynthos aroused belief that virtually all of the island's 120,000 people were left without shelter.

The U.S. Embassy sent its air attaché on an air tour of the stricken islands during the day and reported to the State Department in Washington Wednesday night "the enormity of the tragedy."

The United States, Britain and other foreign countries rushed to aid the Greek government in rescue work.

Messages were sent to Gen. David M. Schlatter, acting chief of the NATO Southern Command, and to the U.S. 6th Fleet advising of the needs for help.

Reports to Athens said the earth shocks extended from the stricken west coast islands as far as Lamia in Central Greece, but no damage was reported inland.

Up to a late hour Wednesday night there were no official estimates of casualties in the new wave of quakes. Unofficially, observers said the dead would total in the hundreds.

Rothschild Case Revived By McCarthy

WASHINGTON — A lawyer for Edward Rothschild said Wednesday the 42 year old federal bookbinder was cleared in 1949 by a government loyalty board of charges now raised again before Sen. McCarthy's investigation subcommittee.

The lawyer, Charles E. Ford, went over with reporters a transcript of hearings held in November and December, 1948, by the Government Printing Office's loyalty board in connection with allegations made against Rothschild.

This showed that Rothschild denied under oath that he was or ever had been a member of the Communist Party.

Ford and Stanley Frosh, another of Rothschild's lawyers, also gave newsmen a March 3, 1949 letter which they said the government bookbinder had received from H. H. Wright, then secretary of the printing officer's loyalty board.

It said the information developed in the hearings "is satisfactory to the board."
