Early Release Plan Offered By Air Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force said Wednesday that all its enlisted personnel — male and female — in non-critical categories who have completed three years of active military service may apply for release on Sept. 15.

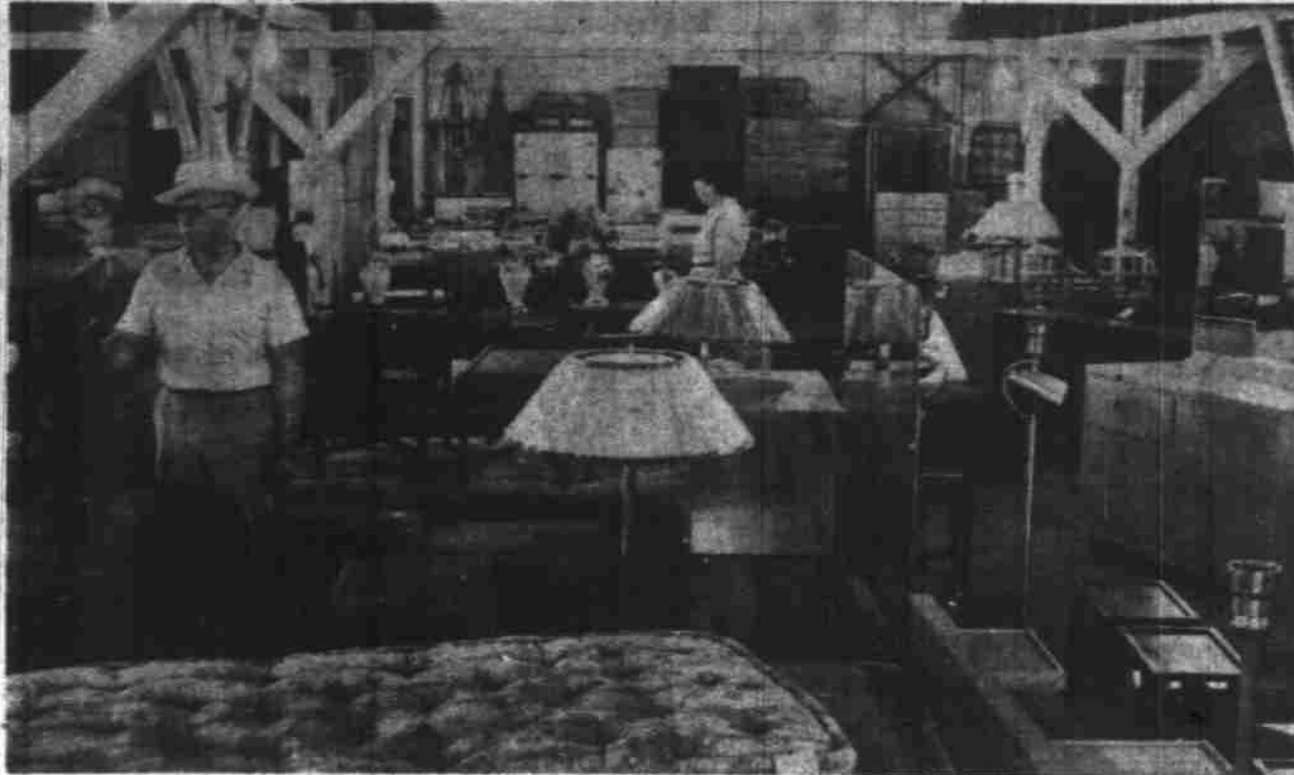
Airmen and women volunteers normally serve four year tours. Those receiving discharges under the new policy will be barred from reenlisting within 90 days, the Air Force said, to prevent them from seeking discharge for the sole purpose of obtaining new assignments and re-enlistment benefits.

Early releases will be permitted only by enlisted personnel serving in the continental United States and who are "surplus" to the needs of the service.

A spokesman said under this policy active military service will include all previous service in any U. S. military branch.

An Air Force spokesman said there was no estimate of the number of men and women who might take advantage of this early release offer.

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — The surprising reunion of the unrelated Mulkeys came off this year with an even bigger surprise than usual. The annual surprise is to see just who turns up. Any Mulkey can.

Mrs. P. A. Mulkey, who lives at a settlement named Cougar in the wilds of the upper Lewis River, started it by writing letters in World War II to scores of service men. She wrote to anyone named Mulkey.

After the war she started an annual Mulkey barbecue at her home. But she always feared a bear might show up to make off with the beef if the barbecue pit were left unattended. So she posted two men with rifles at the pit this year.

Sure enough, a bear, sniffing roast beef, trotted in. The guards dropped it in its track.

Some 200 Mulkeys had both barbecued beef and bear.

Allies Conduct Talk on Korea Conference

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The United States and its 15 U. N. allies in the Korean War met for more than four hours Wednesday night but failed to reach any decisions on the time, place and composition of the forthcoming Korean political conference.

They called another meeting for Thursday afternoon in the hope of arriving at a concrete plan. One reliable source said they expected to get a resolution in shape by Thursday night.

Representatives of the 15 other countries were dinner guests of Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., chief U. S. delegate to the U. N. They declined to disclose any details of their conversations, saying only that there was a preliminary exchange of views.

Sec. Stevens Flying Home From Orient

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Army Secretary Stevens and four veterans of the Korean War arrived here Wednesday after a 19-hour flight from Seoul and left a short while later for Washington.

Stevens said the hasty flight was being made so he could attend retirement ceremonies in the capital city for Gen. J. Lawton Collins Thursday.

With him were Cpl. Melvin Lewis, 23, Newport News, Va.; Sgt. Donald Cody, 23, New York City; Sgt. Kenneth Hansen, 23, Callender, Iowa; and Sgt. I. C. R. L. Fischer, 22, Bowling Green, Ohio.

The soldiers all were members of the Eighth Army and said their families are unaware they are coming home.

Stevens said the plane made one stop, at Misawa, Japan, en route here, and flew at 17,000 feet to get above the bad North Pacific weather. Pilot of the plane was Maj. T. L. Rider of Ponca City, Okla.

Bank Guard, Bandit Shot

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A bandit and a guard were wounded in a gun battle Wednesday after a hold-up attempt during business hours in a downtown bank.

The gunman, identified by the FBI as Louis William Hemmert, 34, was shot in the shoulder and neck. His condition is critical. One of the guards who assisted in the capture received a bullet wound in the leg.

No one else was injured, although a spent slug landed in the coat pocket of a customer, Frank L. Freshell, 82.

The FBI said Hemmert was sentenced to a 12-year prison term at McNeil Island on June 1, 1944.
