Fishing for salmon in the salt is certainly a grand sport but it is sad to think that every season finds anglers who seem to value a salmon higher than their own lives.

The summer time with its usual warm to hot weather inland nearly always brings winds along the coast. A change of tide with an increasing afternoon wind and you can bet that the "old man of the sea" is out looking for trouble. He usually finds it somewhere along the Northwest coast. It seems to this writer that the U.S. Coast Guard should be handed a bit more power governing the boating fraternity. As it is now, if you are foolish enough, you can put to sea in a canoe. As a matter of fact you could even try "three men in a tub."

Silver salmon are giving a few anglers lots of fun off Pacific City around Haystack Rock. We're set to try our luck at that spot this coming Friday. Weather permitting we'll take our first venture through the surf at Cape Kiwanda and try for salmon with the ever popular mooching method, using herring.

There is no doubt in our mind but that the herring will work wonders around Haystack Rock. Word has it that the "Rock" area is also frequented by halibut as well as numerous other fishes. We trust the winds will find some place else to blow on that promising day.

Month of August Tough on Trout Anglers

August usually means poor trout fishing in the streams and lakes of inland Oregon. The hot weather drives the fish to deeper and cooler water and it is difficult to most of the time to find something that will lure them from their shade trees.

One of the most effective methods of taking the trout from streams during the "hot days" is that of nymph fishing. In the late evening with the sun off the water most of the trout will move to shallower water and will be on the lookout for something to eat.

Few bug hatches occur in late summer and dry fly fishing is at its poorest on most waters. The small midge larvae then forms a major portion of the trout's diet. A tiny nymph fished just barely below the surface will nearly always put a few fish in the creel.

Sea run cutthroat (blueback) are giving their followers a bad time as usual. Although the fish are long since in the coastal streams, their habits have changed to go along with the warmer waters of the fresh water section of the streams.

Coast rivers are low at this time of year and the sea-run fish, coming from cold salt water, find the change in the temperature not too much to their liking. They become rather inactive and are inclined to refuse most offerings during the mid-day hours.

You Can Get 'Em Better Late in Day

The last legal hour of fishing is usually the best time for the fish after they are in fresh water. Occasionally an early morning try will reward the angler. A cool, foggy day will produce more fish than will the warm sunny days. The sea-run cutthroat is a temperamental fish and has to be handled as such.

Summer steelhead are now well into the Deschutes River and the dyed-in-the-wool steelie man will find plenty of excitement awaiting him in the big, rough water of the lower Deschutes.

At Stiles, where the Deschutes empties into the Columbia, a road turns up-river. You have to walk now, as the gate is locked due to careless anglers leaving it open in the past for cattle to roam at will.

From one to four miles up the river there are plenty of deep runs and holding spots for the summer steelhead. A spinning outfit is ideal for this water as the fish are often "far away" and you have to toss a lure a mighty long way.

The Deschutes summer steelhead run large for summer steelies. Frank Wire tells us of fish that have hit 16 lbs. Many will go over the 10 lb. mark and it is a rough and tumble battle with big fish in big, fast water.

Caps Capture 3-1, 6-1 Wins

Slumping Solons Lose Ground in WI Chase

CAPILANO STADIUM, Vancouver.—(Special)—The Vancouver Capilanos, again getting effective pitching, swept a Western International League twinbill from Salem's slumping and hit-hungry Senators Wednesday night by 3-1 and 6-1 counts. The double victory gave the Caps a sweep of the four-game series, put them within half a game of the second place Solons and at the same time dropped the Senators further below the leading Spokane Indians.

Bob Roberts scattered seven hits in pitching the second game win. The lone Senator tally came in the second inning on a fielder's choice, a walk to Chuck Essegian and Pitcher Dave Dahle's single to center, scoring Essegian.

Dahle, who was after his sixth win and instead got his seventh setback of the season, yielded a pair of runs in the first on three hits and a throwing error by Gene Tansell helped the Caps to another in the second. Two hits and an error in left by Essegian gave Vancouver two more insurance runs in the fourth.

In the first game Carl Gunnarson, a former Senator, got revenge on his former onetime mates with a tight six-hit pitching job. Lefty Carl bludgeoned Salem until the seventh inning when Les Witherspoon doubled to right, went to third on a throwing error on Shortstop Bob Buckowatz and scored via a single by Catcher Bud Masterson.

Jack Hemphill went the pitching distance for the Solons, giving eight blows as he took his ninth loss of the campaign against 14 wins.

The Caps banged two off Jack in the first inning on an error by Dick Sabatini at third base and singles by Buckowatz, Manager Harvey Storey and Frank Mascaro. The other Vancouver run came in the third when Storey again singled, moved up on a hit by Dureto and tallied on Mascaro's long fly from that point on Hemphill hurled good ball.

Hemphill himself led the hitting for his team with a two for two evening.

A hefty crowd of 3,287 turned out for the doubleheader, one reason being that the program was a benefit to bend Doug Hepburn, Canadian weight-lifter, to Sweden.

The Senators open a series at Victoria Thursday night.
