

Stars Back Into PCL Crown As Seattle Drops Twin Bill

A Nucleus, and Green Hands... Fifty Report for Drills On Willamette's Grid

A 50-man Willamette University football squad went through a double-barreled drill session Monday as the fall practice grind commenced under the eyes of Head Man Ted Ogden and Line Skipper Jerry Frei.

The squad includes 17 lettermen from 1952 and 24 freshmen candidates. But lost from last season are 22 men, including 17 monogram winners. Consequently Ogden has plenty of holes to plug by the time the season opener arrives Oct. 19th against College of Puget Sound at McCulloch Stadium in Salem.

Four All-Northwest Conference selections from last season are again available. They are Center Ken Cooper, Guards Cliff York and Rubie Menashe and Linebacker Andy George.

Nucleus of the '53 backfield likely will be Quarterback John Kent and Halves Bobby Zoelch, Lou Loftland and Mickey Gosh. All lettered last season. Kent was No. 2 field general behind Benny Holt, one of the many missing from '52.

Ogden's big problem, of course, is preparing his men for duty on both offense and defense in line with the rule changes. Scarcely any Bearcats saw double duty last season.

Monday's opening session consisted of lots of running in the morning and plenty of passing work in the afternoon.

The Bearcats won five games, tied two and dropped two last season, finishing third in the conference race.

Rising Seals Near First Division Spot

The Hollywood Stars won the Pacific Coast League pennant Monday while backing up, but bounced back in the nightcap to put frosting on the 1953 crown by defeating Oakland, 3-1.

Seattle's fading Rainiers permitted the Stars to enter by the back door by dropping a double header to Sacramento at Seattle, 7-3 and 12-0. Oakland took its first game from the new champions by a 5-0 count on Jess Flores' sparkling three-hitter. Roy Welmaker won for Hollywood in the brief closeout.

Buddy Peterson led a batting onslaught with four hits in five trips as San Diego walloped Portland, 15-4, in the first game of the night doubleheader at San Diego. But Jehosie Heard tamed the Padres on five hits in the nine-inning second game to give the Beavers a 4-1 triumph and a split in the Labor Day special.

Portland's second game victory kept them in the first division a full game ahead of the climbing San Francisco Seals who slipped through Los Angeles at Sells Stadium by 5-4 and 7-2 counts. The double loss for the Angels on the other hand left them only half a game above the Beavers in the closing Coast League standings.

Among those to report at once is outfielder Stanley Palys, who hit .325 and 18 home runs with Spokane, Wash., of the Western International League.

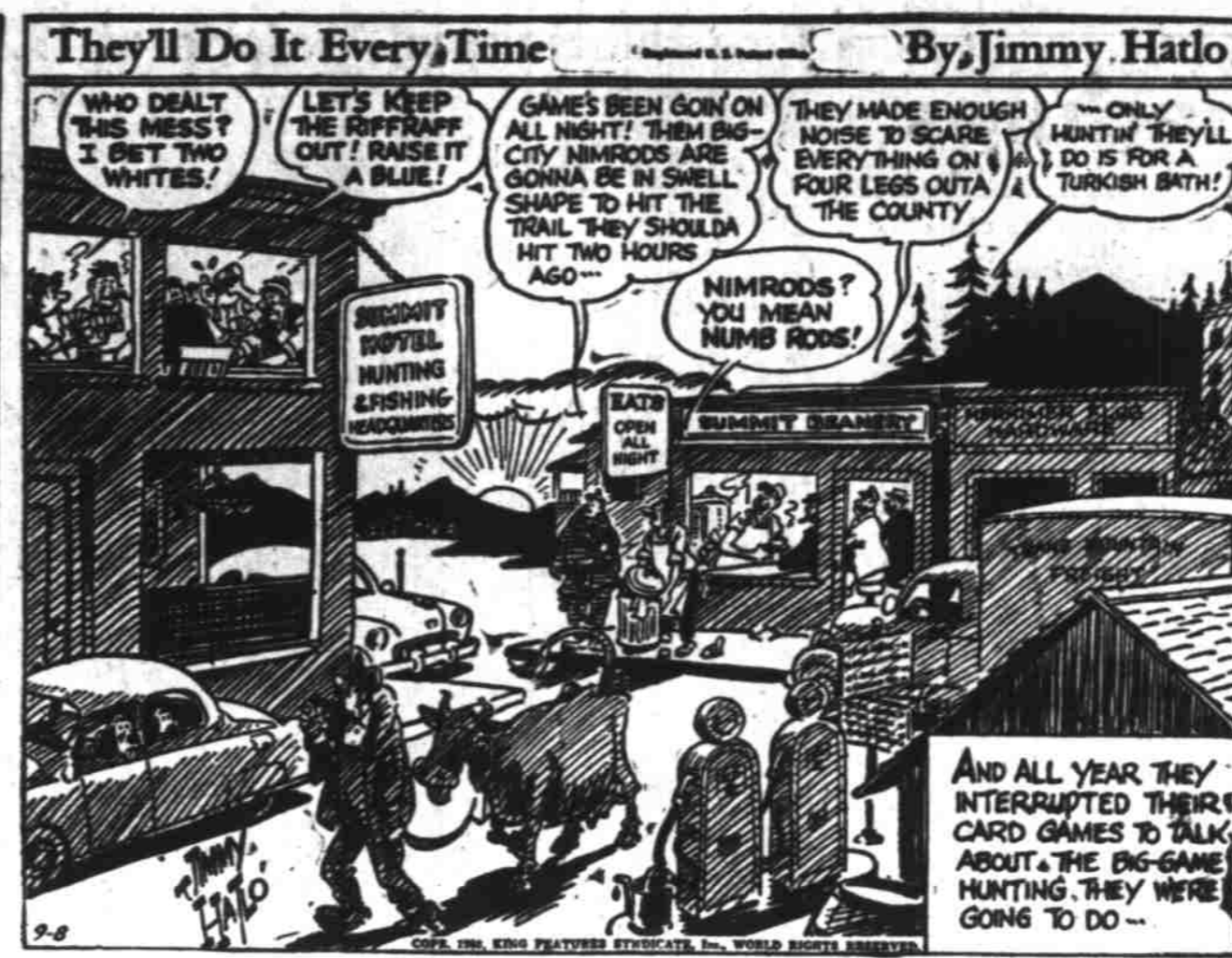
Trabert Continues Net Routs, Rips Seixas for National Title

No Block and Run... Huskies' 11 Unknown Quantity in PCC Race

SEATTLE (AP)—Johnny Cherberg is as well known around this village as your next door neighbor, but on the national scene the new head coach of the University of Washington is an unknown, untried rookie.

And the team he'll toss into the football grab-bag this autumn is another unknown quantity, deep in promise but shallow in recognized stars.

Cherberg has two fat advantages over the average first year coach: (1) he has worked with the players all through their college years and (2) he'll stick to the system with a few changes that Howie Odell installed when he came here from Yale in 1948.

Johnny was fresh coach under Odell and moved into the top job when Howie was dismissed last winter. Using Odell's flashy version of the T-formation, his freshman teams ran a victory string of 22 games. The entire squad knows Cherberg and knows the system.

The chief change in tactics will be a switch to crisp, solid blocking, a departure from the brush-blocks featured in Odell's T. The new anti-substitution rule has forced concentration on tackling, too, especially for backs who played on offense only in the past.

Quarterbacks who never had a dirty jersey are learning the kneehigh embrace.
