

# State's Angling Conditions Vary for Weekend

PORTLAND (AP)—Here is the weekly fishing report of the Oregon Game Commission:  
Northwest — Upstream trout angling is poor to fair with some good catches of sea-run cutthroat. Some schools of jack salmon are working upstream locally. Salmon angling in bays and tidewater has been slow but is improving. Fishing in Lincoln county has been fair. Salmon fishing in tidewater area is slow.

Southwest — Winchester Bay has been fair to good for silvers. Spiny-ray and catfish angling have been good in Siletcoos and Taknetch lakes. Catfish angling in Tenmile Lake is good.

Salmon fishing in the lower Rogue has been fair to good. Steelhead fishing in the lower Rogue is slow but good in the Agness area. Salmon fishing in other coastal streams has been slow. Some good catches of trout have been reported on the Sixes and Chetco rivers. Trout fishing is fair in the main Rogue river. Steelhead catches are spotty throughout the Rogue river because of rocky water. Drifting by boat in the Galice area is producing the best results on lures and wobblers. Bear creek is quite muddy from the week-end storm. Trout and steelhead angling throughout the upper Umpqua

River areas have been very slow. Trout fishing closed on the North Umpqua above Steamboat and the South Umpqua above Jackson creek on September 7. Elsewhere, the summer season runs to October 11. Some silver salmon and fall Chinook have been taken in the area of the Forks although angling is still slow.  
Central-East and Paulina lakes are only fair. Big Lava lake produced many nice catches over the week end. North Twin lake has been good. South Twin lake was only fair. Upper and Little Deschutes river provided good fishing. Crane Prairie reservoir provided many good catches over the week end. Wickiup reservoir, Sparks, Odell, and Gold lakes are only fair. Blue Lake has been good. Three Creeks lake continues to be good. Metolius river is improving. The High lakes are producing good catches.  
Northeast — Willows river above the falls has been excellent with flies. Upper Imnaha river produced some nice catches of rainbow on bait. Limit catches have been made at Fish Lake in Baker county on dry flies. In the Wallows, Aneroid, Horseshoe, Douglas, Ice, and Steamboat lakes have been excellent on both flies and spinners. Steelhead fishing has been good in the Columbia river below McNary dam.

## Sutton Brings His 'Hot' GMC

Lean Len Sutton, the popular "Lil Abner" who has ridden a racing mean buzz buggy in the big Indianapolis-type cars, will pilot his pet GMC-powered mount in Sunday's dirt track races at Lone Oak track on the State Fairgrounds.  
It will be the same car in which Sutton recently finished second in a Bay Area marathon race, and in which he won the 100-mile classic on Labor Day at Portland Meadows.  
Sutton will lead a field of well over 20 big cars into the Sunday program, with time trials starting at 1:30 p.m., races at 2:30. The card on the dirt racing strip will consist of trials, Trophy Dash, three heat races, a Class B main event and a 35-lap Class A main event.  
Many of the big cars which competed against Sutton at Portland Meadows, including some from Washington, California and Canada, will be here for the Sunday races, final speed event of the State Fair.  
Special work on the track, right after the final horse race Saturday, will curtail any possible dust Sunday, according to officials.

## More Racing At Fair Today

A crowd that increased substantially toward the tail-end of Thursday's card, shaved a total of \$85,864 through the meet leading to top the previous Fair Thursday mark of \$74,507 set last year.

At the opening practices there was a noticeable lack of experienced personnel at the guard and tackle positions. O.C.E. lost the following four letterman guards to the service: Dick Peterson, John LaFontaine, Bob Hart and Coach Humphreys. To add to the Green Chamberlain's woe, the fifth letterman guard, Harry Nossack, has decided to marry and is not returning to school. Last year's outstanding freshman letterman Terry Mahoney, recently received his appointment and is now attending Annapolis. This coupled with the graduation of last season's most valuable football player, Jim Dyal from the other tackle position left quite a vacancy in the front of O.C.E.'s line.  
Coach Bill McArthur states that the unusually small turnout is a surprise to him and he hopes that these boys turning out make up for the lack of quantity by being of fine quality. The backfield prospects are considerably brighter for the Wolves. A quartet of experienced first stringers from last year's season are ready to see action again this year—Gene Owens of Sweet Home at quarterback, Charles Pinion from Reedsport at left halfback, Bill Arnold of Hermiston at fullback and Bud Michaels from Salem at the right halfback position. This is the same starting group which has seen action in several seasons' campaigns. Two alternates with Pinion and Michaels at the left half positions will be two other lettermen, Darrel Davis and Don Wickstrand. Two frosh backfield men have shown considerable promise in the early workouts and may earn a starting berth, C. B. Smart, Jr., from Lockney, Texas, shows good speed and considerable desire to earn himself a starting berth and Wes Lightfoot, a former Mt. Angel prep star has shown considerable ability in the early practices.

PENDLETON (AP)—Defending champions got off to ignoble starts as the 42nd annual Pendleton Round-up opened before an estimated 7,000 spectators Thursday.  
Shot Webster, Lenaph, Okla., the only man ever to have won the all-around cowboy title here four successive years, failed completely in the steer roping contest. His steer would not stay down, and he was unable to catch his horse in time for another crack at the steer within the time limit.  
B. J. Pierce, Clovis, N. M., defending champion in calf roping, took 53.7 seconds to flip and tie a calf, putting him well to the rear of the field.  
That left the way wide open for new performers to take over in the remaining two days of the competition.  
Among those in the forefront is E. V. Dorsey, Sutter Creek, Calif., whose calf-roping time was a near-record 12 1/2 seconds.  
Buck Royce, Havre, Mont., led the first-day bulldogging with a time of 11.8 seconds.

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## Americans Strong Favorites U.S., Canucks Launch Zone Cup Finals Today

MONTREAL (AP)—Taking no chances, the United States will send its two biggest tennis guns—Tony Trabert and Vic Seixas—against Canada Friday in opening singles matches of the American Zone Davis Cup final.  
Trabert, the new national champion, will face left-handed Henri Rochon in the first tilt and Seixas, the Wimbledon titlist, will follow against little Lorne Main, the Dominion's No. 1 performer.

The matches at the Mount Royal Tennis Club are expected to be no more than an American warmup for the challenge round against Australia in December.  
The doubles match is scheduled Saturday with the final two singles Sunday. If Uncle Sam has clinched a decision by Sunday, as anticipated, the two Davis Cup subs, Bernard Bartenz of San Angelo, Tex., and Straight Clark of Pasadena, Calif., may be thrown into action. In the tandem match Saturday, the Trabert-Seixas combination will oppose Main and young Paul Willey, a freshman member of the Canadian squad.
