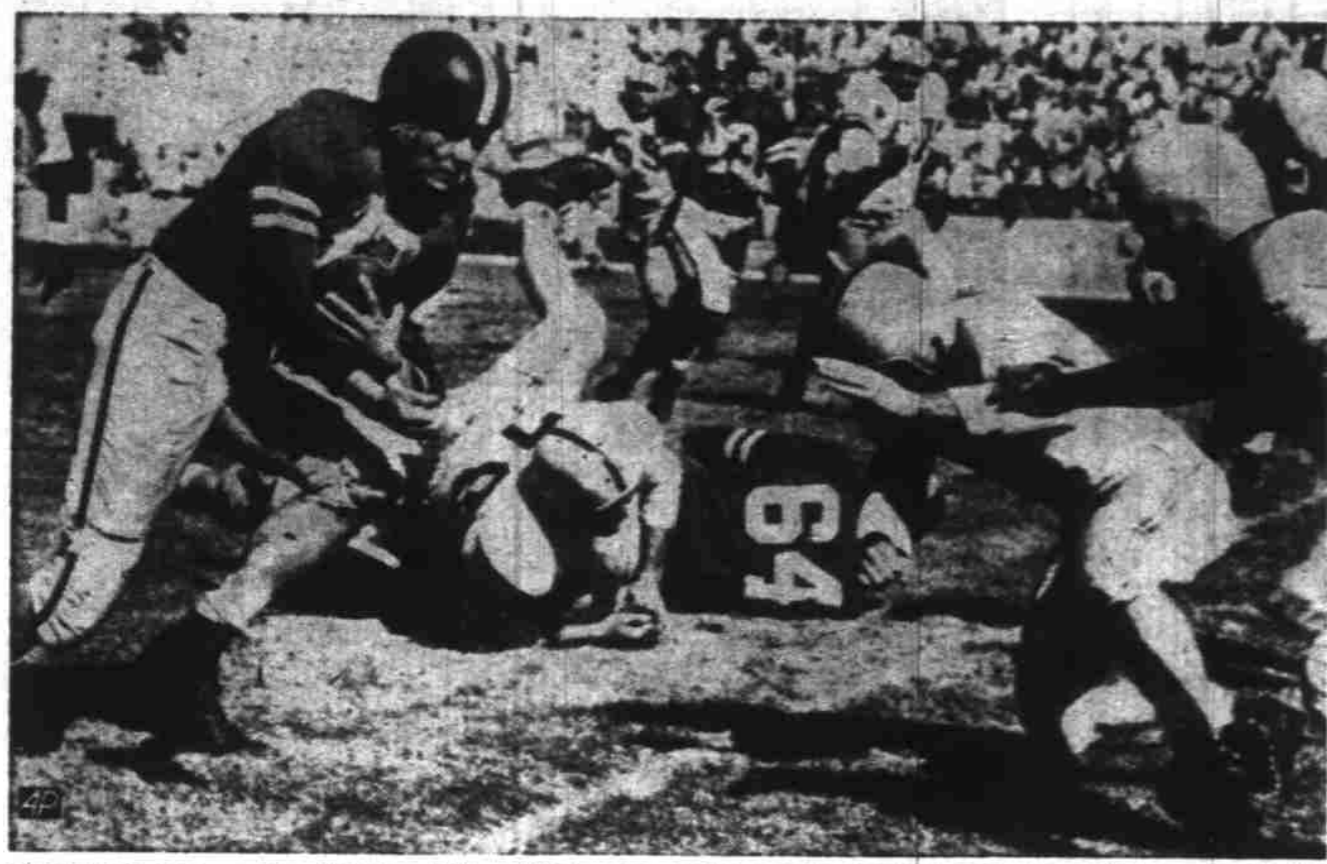


'Husker Makes Futile Yardage Against Ducks

Bruins, Trojans Appear to Be Class of Coast

Ducks, Staters Set 2nd Tests

Beavers Battle Cal, Oregon Faces Cards

The first week's play has confirmed the thesis that the power of Pacific Coast Conference football this season can be found within the city of Los Angeles.

Both UCLA and Southern California came through their initial 1953 encounters without trouble as the Bruins whipped Oregon State 41-0 on Friday and the Trojans of USC beat Washington State 29-13 Saturday. Both were conference games.

In non-conference competition, the coast clubs found the going rough with Oregon turning in the only victory by taking Nebraska 20-12 in the nationally televised in the only victory by taking Nebraska 20-12 in the nationally televised game at Lincoln. Otherwise things were dismal.

Baylor walloped California 25-0, College of the Pacific upset Stanford 25-20 and Colorado edged Washington 21-20. Idaho had dropped a 34-6 verdict Friday to San Jose State.

This weekend a pair of intersectional games are scheduled at the Los Angeles Coliseum where fans will see two of the nation's best halfbacks in action.

Friday night UCLA, led by All America candidate Paul Cameron, hosts Kansas. On Saturday, the University of Minnesota Gophers, spearheaded by 1952 All America Paul Giel, go against the favored SC Trojans.

In another PCC-Big Ten game Saturday, Washington travels to Ann Arbor for a crack at the University of Michigan Wolverines. Two conference games match California at Oregon State and Oregon at Stanford.

Idaho plays Utah at Salt Lake City and Washington State tangles with College of the Pacific at Stockton, Calif.

Aramis Dandoy was the big gun for the Southern California Trojans against Washington State. He scored twice, once on a 91-yard dash, gained 169 yards on 19 rushing plays and completed three of seven passes for 53 additional yards. Linden Crow, right halfback, scooted 88 yards for another Trojan score.

Baylor's quarterback Cotton Davidson directed the winning attack against California.

He scored touchdowns in the second and fourth quarters on sneaks from the one-yard line and called the plays that sent halfback L. G. Dupre over from the one in the first period and halfback Jerry Coody into the end zone from three yards out in the third.

Sophomore Homer Jenkins of Colorado ran, passed and quick kicked the favored Washington Huskies into submission. The Huskies scored first when guard Jim Noe went 77 yards after plucking a fumble out of the air. Then Jenkins engineered a drive climaxed by his 16-yard pass to Gary Knafele.

Unbeaten Viks Host Albany Friday Night

A Salem High School grid crew that is traveling at one of the fastest paces in Vik history, gets into tougher competition Friday night in the home opener with Albany's Bulldogs at Waters Park.

Coach Lee Gustafson's men racked up their second straight win of the campaign via a 40-0 victory over a so-so Astoria team, after having topped Cleveland of Portland 21-0 in the season's first start.

A fair idea of just how strong are the Vikings may come in the Albany mix. The Bulldogs had been touted as one of the stronger teams in the district, but some of the zest was removed from that belief when Lebanon upset the Albany's by a 25-18 count on Friday night.

Still the Bulldogs should provide the Gustafson bunch with their first really stern test. Only injuries for the Viks in the Astoria game were slight leg hurts for Linemen Tom Pickens and John Persons. Both should be ready for Albany.

One of the surprises in the Astoria game was the work of the Salem No. 2 backfield unit consisting of Herb Juran, Jim Anderson, Ken Rawlings and Neil Scheidel. Placed in the hall game after more than a quarter of storeless play, the second-liners caught fire and tallied the first Vik touchdown, then added 26 points in the final period.

School opens today so the Vikings will shift from morning to afternoon drills.

Jack Peterson, who missed the UCLA trip because of a pulled leg muscle and Ralph Carr, who played only briefly Friday because of a minor injury, probably will be recovered for the Portland game.

Kip Taylor, OSC coach, said he thought the team would improve as the season progresses. He said he thought Capt. Laverne Ferguson was the outstanding lineman on the field against UCLA.

GROSSINGER, N. Y. (AP) — Rocky Marciano is in the "finest condition of his career and as cool as a cucumber."

That was the verdict of Dr. Vincent Nardiello, New York state athletic commission physician, who examined the heavyweight champion Sunday for defense of his title against Roland LaStarza Thursday at the Polo Grounds.

"He's everything a fighter should be," Dr. Nardiello said after Marciano went four rousing rounds with as many sparmates.

"I'm glad this is over," said sparring partner Mike Nischer, 225-pound heavyweight from St. Paul. "I worked with him before the first LaStarza fight. There is no comparison."

"This is a different fighter. He will hit LaStarza and make him forget everything he ever learned in college or the ring."

Manager Al Weill said Marciano will rest Monday and box a final three rounds Tuesday before breaking camp to go into New York by automobile. He has boxed 142 rounds.

A Bit Of This-'n-That

This story is to be found in the files of the American Casualty Company, Los Angeles Claims Department;

The claims manager opened his mail one morning and in one envelope the "ordinary" piece of mail turned out to be eleven \$20.00 bills. Enclosed with the cash was an anonymous note which explained that the sender had filed an accident report some time ago and the damages were paid by the company. Later, the writer found that one item had been included in error. He was embarrassed, and mistakenly concluded that the insurance company would feel that he had deliberately cheated so he merely enclosed \$220.00 with an anonymous note and returned it to the company.

The company wishes he had signed his name. After all, even insurance companies are composed of human beings and their representatives are understanding and sympathetic in the case of an honest mistake.

(This story confirms what we have believed for a long time: 1) That it is easy to deceive your insurance company and to be overpaid on a claim, and 2) That at least 99% of the American people are scrupulously honest and without their honesty the insurance industry as it is known today could not long exist.)

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
