Salem City Council may demand an end to a "freeze" on business property which has held up building in an area where the state has eyed long-range expansion of the Capitol Mall.

Police Arrest Stevedores in Dock Flareup

NEW YORK (U) — Police arrested 13 longshoremen Monday and charged them with riot and unlawful assembly after violence flared up twice on the tension-packed Brooklyn waterfront.

The men arrested were members of the International Longshoremen's Association, now struggling to keep a new AFL dockworkers union from taking over control of labor on East Coast docks.

The new union was formed recently after the AFL ousted the ILA for failing to clean up racketeering within its ranks.

Assistant District Attorney Aron Koota said the 13 men will be arraigned Tuesday for riot, unlawful assembly and conspiracy. He said he plans to seek grand jury indictments Wednesday.

Portland Road Accidents Cut, Council Told

Portland Road accidents have been fewer since the divided four-lane highway went in last year, Salem City Council was told Monday night by City Manager J. L. Franzen, on the basis of State Highway Department figures.

The state recorded 33 accidents in the year before the change, 16 in the year since.

These figures were offered by the state after the city forwarded a complaint from E. A. Randle that the divided highway was hazardous and kept drivers from turning into business places.

Recommending legislation to slow traffic entering the city on Portland Road by a caution light and then make turning off the highway easier by removing the "jiggle bars" in the highway center, Alderman David O'Hara said he thought this course "the lesser of evils."

Businesses Protest

He said no other Salem business section is penalized in such a way as the present Portland Road setup. Turning left into business places is discouraged by the divider because there are no cross streets in the area.

The forthcoming one-way grid in downtown Salem came in for proposed changes at the Council meeting last night at City Hall.

At one point the aldermen by a vote defeated a motion to keep Church Street for two-way traffic between Ferry and Trade Streets. W. J. Braun, a businessman affected by the grid as planned, asked that the city at least take steps to ease the congestion of trucks and trains on Cottage and Trade Streets when the one-way plan puts heavier traffic around that block.

Drive Around Block

A Ferry Street car wash business to get cars parked on its own lot will have to drive them around the block after taking them off the wash rack, it was also reported.

In connection with the grid several parking changes were ordered, including a change from angle to parallel parking for the entire Courthouse block, the south side of State between Church and High and the west side of Church between Ferry and Trade. Meters will be changed from 3-hour to 1-hour on Church between Ferry and State Streets.

Another parking change recommended would prohibit parking on the east side of North Liberty between High Street and the PGE driveway near Mill Creek. Action on this was deferred.

All future parallel parking will be of the new style, with bumper-to-bumper parking of cars in paired spaces, with maneuver space left between each pair, the aldermen agreed.

Resolution Cites Needs of Fire District

SOUTH SALEM — Five needs of the Liberty - Salem Heights Volunteer Fire Department were cited Monday night in a resolution passed unanimously by 16 firemen attending a meeting.

The resolution asked directors of the district to bring the "needs" to the attention of voters in the district. The resolution hinted at a mass resignation of firemen at the end of the year if the request was not fulfilled.

The resolution declared the need of a new fire hall, storage space and drying room for hose, training facilities and additional equipment "which would lead to a further decrease of the fire insurance rates of this district."

Also cited was need of a signal light at the intersection of Highway 99-E and Lansford Drive, the street leading to the fire house. A hazardous condition was declared to exist.

Firemen declared they could not be responsible for care and maintenance of equipment unless the pertinent requirements were met.

The fire district serves Morningside and portions of Pringle and Rosedale as well as Liberty and Salem Heights. Neale Chaney, president of the volunteer department, estimated there were 1,500 houses in the district.

Sackett Buys TV Building

SAN FRANCISCO (U) — Sheldon Sackett, president of KVAN, Vancouver, Wash., Monday announced the purchase for \$140,000 of a building in Vancouver to house KVAN's television and radio studios.

Sackett said the structure was bought from the Coca Cola Bottling Co. of Oregon. The transaction was handled by Whitfield Bros., of Portland.

Fred Chitty, KVAN general manager, said the station hoped to start television operations in the Vancouver-Portland area shortly after Jan. 1. He said KVAN also was seeking TV facilities in Portland.

Death Toll in Eugene Crash Raised to Five

EUGENE (U) — The death toll in a two-car collision south of here early Sunday increased to five Monday.

Carl W. Anderson, 22, Eugene, died in a hospital here from injuries.

Ronald Coakes, 23, his fiancée, Frances Webber, 24, and Mrs. Donald Coakes, 21, all of Eugene, were killed outright. Donald, Ronald's twin brother, died several hours after the crash.

The Coakes and Miss Webber were in one car. Anderson was in the other automobile with Mr. and Mrs. Loyd D. Maugh, Eugene, who were injured.

Donald Coakes and his wife, Mavis, had been married only three weeks. Ronald Coakes and Miss Webber were to have been married next Friday.

State police said there were no witnesses to the accident, which happened at the junction of Highway 99 and State Highway 126. It was Lane County's worst accident in seven years.

State to Extend Water Grade Gorge Route

THE DALLES (U) — By Nov. 1 the water grade route from Portland through the Columbia Gorge will extend within 10 miles of The Dalles, the State Highway Department has announced here.

The newest section of the route, a six-mile stretch now being completed between Rowena and Mosier, will by-pass the dangerous Rowena loops on the old Columbia River Highway.

Another six-mile stretch, under construction from Rowena to a point west of The Dalles, is scheduled for completion next September.

Portland Power Poles Snap, But Wires Hold

PORTLAND (U) — Two poles carrying 4,000 volt power lines snapped at the base here Monday. The wires held and prevented the poles from falling on nearby houses. There was no break in power service.

Model Claims Engagement to Clark Gable

PARIS (U) — Pretty blonde Suzanne Dadoile, a 22-year-old model for designer Schiaparelli's clothes, said in an interview Monday that Clark Gable had asked her a year ago to be his companion "all over the world and the rest of my life."

A few months later they became informally engaged, said the green-eyed girl, but any formal announcement of future plans must come from the actor himself.

In Amsterdam, where Gable is making a movie romance, "The True and the Brave," based on the Dutch resistance in World War II, the actor's press representative declared, "Clark Gable has no plans for engagement or marriage and hasn't given his promise to engage or marry."

Suzanne said she met Gable, at a cocktail party in September, 1952 after his divorce from Lady Sylvia Ashley, widow of Douglas Fairbanks. Later, she said, he gave her a big topaz ring.

Norway Labor Government Leads in Vote

OSLO, Norway (U) — The 18-year-old Labor government of Prime Minister Oscar Torp led all opposition parties in inconclusive returns Tuesday from Norway's general elections.

With more than one-half of the vote counted in Sunday's contest for 150 seats in parliament, Labor increased its total vote over the last election in 1945, but it was uncertain whether the party would command an overall majority of seats.

Torp has said repeatedly he will not form a government without an absolute majority. Between 70 and 80 per cent of the nation's 2,300,000 eligible voters cast ballots.

Results from 588 of 944 districts gave this popular vote (1949 vote in brackets):
Labor 477,053 (462,103)
Agrarians 125,311 (109,344)
Christian Demos 118,919 (98,483)
Liberals 105,922 (149,199)
Conservatives 141,127 (134,793)
Communists 47,025 (53,127)

In the 1949 elections Labor got 85 seats although it won less than 46 per cent of the popular vote. A new election law passed by the last parliament gives smaller parties a better chance to make a showing.

The Communists were trailing badly. The Liberal Party, too, made a surprisingly poor showing.

The main opposition to Torp had come from the Liberals who contended that government regulation of prices and production had crippled free enterprise and hurt Norway in world competition.

Schools Told To Admit All Handicapped

PORTLAND (U) — The Portland School Board was ordered Monday by Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson to admit all handicapped children, including those attending parochial schools, to special classes.

The father of a student at Holy Cross Parish School who received lip reading instruction last year had filed a complaint stating that the child had been refused such training this fall.

The school board had refused to grant non-public school students the training on grounds it was not required by law to do so.

Judge Dobson ruled that his interpretation of the law was incorrect and ordered the board to readmit parochial students to the classes or to appear in court Oct. 30 to show cause why it hasn't.

Chinese Signs Torso Slaying Confession

NEW YORK (U) — A 34-year-old Chinese restaurant worker has admitted the torso slaying of Kay Gibbon, street walker and dope addict whose carved up body was found in a suitcase Sunday, Police Commissioner George F. Monaghan announced Monday night.

Monaghan identified the man as James Lew and said the slaying stemmed from Lew's jealousy in a triangle love situation.

Before Lew's admission, police had questioned hundreds of persons, including a man identified by officers as Murray Spivack.

Spivack was released, but Monaghan, in announcing Lew's confession, said Spivack was the other person involved in the love triangle.

Monaghan gave this account of the slaying:
Lew who was born in China had a date with the woman last Friday evening. They wound up in his furnished room around 3 a. m. Saturday morning.

In a quarrel over Spivack, Miss Gibbon slapped Lew's face. He told her not to do it again, and when she did, he stabbed her in the abdomen with a steak knife eight or nine times.

Several hours later he dismembered the body with the same knife. Early Sunday morning he made three trips from his second floor room at 68 West 94th St., carrying the body out in separate parcels.

On the last trip he carried the head and three fingers in a paper bag and put it in a sidewalk trash can. This package had not been recovered at the time of the confession.

Lew then disposed of blood stained clothing and a couch cover, washed the walls and floor of his room and laundered his own clothes.

Monaghan quoted Lew as saying he had also planned to kill Spivack if he got a chance.
