## Employment In Building Trades Drops

More building construction workers are out of work this fall than is usually normal for this time of year, it was revealed Tuesday.

Herbert Barker, secretary of the Building Trades Union here, estimated about 50 workers, representing various building trades such as carpenters, electricians, plumbers and others are out of work.

"This is not too bad a situation," said Barker, "although usually at this time of year all our local men are working and we even hire 'drifters.' The bad part is that the layoffs are coming in good building weather."

State employment officials confirmed Barker's statements. Neither they nor Barker seemed to know the reason for the layoffs. Several possible reasons could include the fact that several large local construction projects such as at the two Salem hospitals and high school are winding up construction. "Another thing," said Barker, "New mechanical methods of building construction use less men on the job than formerly. Take the new courthouse. There they use pre-fabricated window-sills, which carpenters used to build on the spot."
