Firemen Add Deodorizer

Salem firemen—long praised for their efficient clean-up and salvage work at fires—have added a new piece of equipment which should bring joy to the housewife with a burned-up roast—a deodorizer.

The new gimmick sprays out a misty fog which within seconds kills smoke smells, odors from burned-up meats and so forth. About 16-inches long the deodorizer is run by an electric motor and has a small tank containing the liquid smell-killer. Firemen report it works fine.

NEWPORT (AP) — The trial of Richard Thomson, Newport auto dealer accused of assault with intent to kill, opened in circuit court here Tuesday.

Nine jurors were selected, all of them living outside the city. Selection of the jury will resume Wednesday.
