## R. E. Cottine Dies Following Heart Attack

Rudolph E. Cottine, 57, late resident of 3985 S. Pacific Highway, died of a heart attack Sunday while on a hunting trip to Tule Lake, Calif.

Cottine was born Jan. 8, 1896, in New York City and first came to Salem in 1935 from Los Angeles and founded the Capitol Tile Company. He sold the business in 1936 and returned to Los Angeles.

A naval veteran of both World Wars, Cottine returned to Salem following his military service and he and Mrs. Cottine bought a home in the Middle Grove community. The couple later moved to their home on S. Pacific Highway.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Anna R. Cottine of Salem; a sister in New York; and several nieces and nephews. A son, Edward R. Cottine, was killed on Okinawa during World War II. Funeral services will be held in Los Angeles.

## Truck Driver Quits After Fatal Wreck

DUNCAN, Okla. (AP)—A Fort Worth, Tex., truck driver, involved in his first accident in 23 years on the road, walked from the wreckage Sunday to telephone his employer he was quitting.

An elderly Stillwater, Okla., man, Arthur L. Rippey, was killed in the four-vehicle collision.

The Highway Patrol said James Ernest Few, 45, Fort Worth, was so unnerved by the wreck that he telephoned his resignation to the Able Trucking Co.

## Fire Burns Out Portland Tavern

PORTLAND (P)—The interior of a downtown tavern was virtually burned out early Monday after an explosion which investigators said was caused by gas from a supply line from which someone had removed the plug.

Assistant Fire Marshal Henry Burns said the blaze was started by an arsonist. Detectives said six other attempts to set the place on fire had been made after the tavern closed.

Residents of second-floor apartments were evacuated as firemen fought the two-hour blaze.

## Idaho, Oregon Onion Raisers To Map Plans

ONTARIO, Ore. (P)—Idaho and Oregon onion growers will meet Tuesday to map a program designed to avert what spokesman called a "chaotic situation" in the onion industry.

Joe Saito, Ontario, president of the Idaho and Oregon Onion Growers Assn., has called a mass meeting of growers and representatives of allied industries. More than 300 are expected to attend.

The association sent a telegram to Secretary of Agriculture Benson asking his approval of a plan to destroy 25 per cent of the crop to boost prices.

The current price brings growers less than the storage cost of 10 to 30 cents per hundredweight, the association advised Benson.

It said approximately 300 Idaho and Oregon growers hold 5,000 carloads of field-run onions from the 1953 crop. Growers are willing to destroy a quarter of them to recover a portion of their production costs on the remainder, the telegram said, if they can do so without violating antitrust laws.

The association asked Benson to encourage other onion producers throughout the United States to do the same.

## Stock Market Drops Slowly

NEW YORK (P)—The stock market declined Monday without undue haste in late stages of trading.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 30 cents at \$108.00. It was down 20 cents on Friday. The industrial and railroad components of the average each declined 50 cents each while the utilities managed to gain a dime.

There were 1,181 individual issues in the list of stocks traded with 363 down and 518 up. New lows for the year at 53 expanded to the highest total in many weeks. There were 32 new highs registered.

Volume came to 1,540,000 shares as compared with 1,440,000 shares traded Friday.

## Weakness in Grain Market

CHICAGO (P)—Grains were easier throughout most of the session on the board of trade Monday and in the closing minutes wheat and corn developed a distinct weakness.

Wheat closed 1 1/4 to 3 cents lower, corn 1/2 to 2 cents lower, oats 1/2-3/4 lower, rye 1/2 lower to 3/4 higher, soybeans 1/4 to 3/4 cents lower and lard unchanged to 25 cents and a hundred pounds lower.
