Morse Asks Code Given to Investigators

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore.) said Sunday that in congressional investigations, "the real abuse is the abuse of procedure."

He gave that answer to a radio-TV panel questioner (NBC's Youth Wants to Know) who asked his opinion of investigations such as those conducted by Chairman McCarthy (R-Wis.) of the Senate Permanent Investigations Subcommittee.

Morse said he does not favor halting congressional probes, but thinks committees should give witnesses the same safeguards they would have in any court of law. For that reason, he said, he is sponsoring a bill to set up a mandatory code for all such committees.

He criticized as "a great mistake" administration plans to end the excess profits tax and cut income taxes 10 per cent on Jan. 1 and told his youthful audience the action will "pass the burden on to people of your generation."

"We are at peace," he said, "and we ought to get ourselves in an economic situation so that if we get in war we will have some economic stability."

Passes to Carry Browns' Hopes in Playoff Game

CLEVELAND.—Cleveland's Browns who haven't won the pro crown in two years, expect to have their favorite weapon—passing—in better working order when they meet the Detroit Lions this time in the National Football League's championship playoff.

Otto Graham is flipping better than ever and this year he will have a full squad of greedy receivers when the Browns meet the Lions Dec. 27 in the Motor City.

Halfback Dub Jones and end Mac Speedie, Cleveland's two top catchers then, went lame in the last regular game of the 1932 season and missed the playoff against Detroit.

Since together they had nabbed 105 passes for 1,562 yards, the Browns had to concentrate on running in that game, which the Lions won, 17-7. The only top, experienced receiver left was end Dante Lavelli.

Lavelli is back this year, just as tricky as ever, and with lots of help. He, halfback Ray Renfro, end Pete Brewster and Jones have accounted for three-quarters of Cleveland's 191 completions this year.

Pair Improve

Renfro and Brewster, both in their second pro year, got their first real experience in that last title game and since then have turned into stickouts.

Coach Paul Brown thinks Renfro is about the best half in the league and was somewhat put out when his lad was not included among the players picked by league teams to take part in the annual all-pro game.

"Apparently Renfro didn't impress the other teams," Brown remarked. "All he did was beat 'em."

Graham, who completed 64.7 per cent of his 258 passes for 2,722 yards, credits improved catching for his average of 10.6 yards a try, which is the best in his eight years of pro competition.

Another new scoring threat facing the Lions is Billy Reynolds, a rookie half from Pitt, who averaged 4.3 yards a carry.
