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Cash Needed to Keep Asia Free, Nixon Tells Ike

(Editor's note: The author of this story, AP staff writer Russell Brines, was one of three newsmen accompanying Vice President Nixon on his fact-finding tour of Asia and the Middle East. Brines, former AP bureau chief in Tokyo and veteran of 17 years' reporting in the Pacific and Far East, returned to the Orient for this trip after a two years' absence.)

WASHINGTON — Vice President Nixon came back from Asia with a prize election year headache for President Eisenhower.

Nixon found, on his 45,000 mile world tour, that the United States may have to spend more money and take a stronger hand in Asian affairs to prevent further Communist gains.

This is sad news for an administration trying to pare expenditures before next November's important congressional elections.

But Nixon brought word, for example, that a far-reaching decision may have to be made in order to save Indo-China, gateway to rich southeast Asia—the really important goal of Communist military aggression in Asia.

The choice, which may have to be made before next November, is this:

Whether to go all-out in backing the French, with more arms and possibly even military forces, in order to keep them in their bitter seven years' war or whether to support growing Paris demands for a Korean-style negotiated truce.

Pakistan Decision

This would risk losing the peninsula politically to the Communists.

A second basic decision may have to be made next year. The question is whether to add vital Pakistan to the armed powers linked to the United States, through a new military aid program, or to bow to violent objections raised by India's Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru.

Either choice means a change of policy. The administration probably faces criticism no matter what it does on these problems, and particularly if it does nothing.

Nixon further saw the need for a complete review and strengthening of American Asiatic policy.

The truth is that after thousands of lives and billions of dollars, the Allied powers have erected, in many parts of Asia, only a house of cards that the Communists can blow down almost at will.

Free Asia in Danger

Politically, there is no overall leadership. Free Asia is in danger of splitting into quarrelling fragments, ripe for Communist plucking. The United States has convinced less than half of free Asia's bewildered people of the need to fight Communism.

Patchwork planning has brought temporary economic stability that is dazzling in the boom towns of Tokyo and Manila. But it rests mainly upon American dollar expenditures, and the boom will collapse when they end.

No progress has been made toward solving the great fundamental problems of Asia—Japan's growing, crowded population; South Korea's inability to support itself; India's vast need for modernization.

Big Question

And the biggest question of all remains unanswered: "Can free Asia exist alongside a powerful, aggressive Red China?"

All indications are that the Chinese Communists now are profiting from the fighting lust to tighten their internal control and strengthen their armies for the next step in a timeless blueprint of conquest.

There is no indication that they have learned any sort of "lesson" by their mauling in Korea.

Instead, time is narrowing the choice between two politically explosive alternatives:

1. To give up piecemeal protection of Asia and try saving it by warning Peiping clearly that its next attack will bring military reprisals against China.

2. To adopt the British-Indian hope that recognizing the Red regime will blunt its aggressive intentions.

Courtesy Uncertain

Free Asia has been drifting under the past two years, largely because of this uncertainty.

There have been local improvements—the leftist Hukbalahaps have been driven to the mountains in the Philippines, and a new regime promises internal reforms; Burma's government is winning its fight against four insurrections; the Malayan Communists have been pushed into the jungle.

But these subversive forces can arise again if Peiping will it. Economic and political improvements are only temporary, if the Chinese Communists march once more.

Military power alone will not save Asia, but the free nations cannot be saved unless Red China, an imperialist nation in her own right is curbed or thwarted.

"Peace" in Korea

The only thing approaching a guaranteed peace along the vast and populous stretch of the Asiatic continent is in Korea. It is underwritten by a double Maginot line of hundreds of underground fortifications along both sides of the truce line.

Guns from these fortifications command every valley and road leading both north and south. They are backed by massed troop and aerial strength. Any attacking army would suffer terrific losses.

It is difficult to believe that either side—or even South Korea's stubborn President-Syngman Rhee—would risk the cost of an attack.

Yet, even in Korea, no one knows how long peace will last, because Peiping and Moscow are making the decisions. And no one knows how long United Nations troops will have to be maintained there to enforce the peace.

Prospects Encouraging

On the second warfront, Indo-China, the immediate military prospect is more encouraging than at any time in this long war between French and Allied forces on the one hand and the Viet Minh rebels of Moscow-trained Ho Chi-Minh on the other.

The new French commander, Gen. Henri Navarre, has brought revitalized strategy to lethargic armies. Recent offensive action, powered by hundreds of millions of dollars worth of American arms has brought hope to some American officials that the Viet Minh can be crushed in a year. Other Americans say it will still take years at the present rate.

In any case, a drive toward military victory will bring the French and the entire Free World up against the perennial question: "What will Red China do?"
