

Tudor Foresees Start Of Reclamation Work

WASHINGTON (AP) — Undersecretary of the Interior Ralph A. Tudor says he believes some new reclamation work is included in the 23 projects which President Eisenhower said Thursday would be started in the year beginning July 1.

It appeared that the President's statement — in the State of the Union Message — amounted to an easing of the Truman administration's ban on most new public works projects. New starts were ordered held down tightly after the Korean War started.

But spokesmen for the White House, the Interior Department and the Budget Bureau could not clarify this point definitely.

"It seems to be a change," the budget official said, but added it could not be fully determined until the budget itself is released and the 23 projects are spelled out.

One interior official said it was his offhand judgment that the 23 new projects constituted a reversal of the Truman order.

From other sources it was learned that reclamation projects possibly included are phases of these: Yuma in Arizona, Minidoka in Idaho, and Carlsbad and Middle Rio Grande in New Mexico, but no details could be learned. At least one congressman interpreted the President's statement as a reversal of the ban against new projects.

Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) said he was "very glad the road blocks against new starts is lifted. This country can't stand still."

Rescue Crew Still Digs for Lost Miner

RAVENSDALE, Wash. (AP) — Crews of miners, relieving each other at short intervals, still dug through a coal and rock-filled chute Thursday night attempting to locate Harry J. English, a trapped miner, but hope he was alive had faded.

English, 39, was caught in a cave-in in mid-forenoon Wednesday 400 feet underground in the Sandburg mine. Four hours later, a companion, Roy Cotts, 25, was dug out alive near the top of the 35-foot chute, but no trace was found of English.

Flexible Price Supports Win Ike's Favor

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower told Congress Thursday future farm programs should use flexible price supports—rather than present mandatory, high-level floors—to stimulate consumption of crops now piling up in government hands.

But, he said, a shift to the flexible system—now set to go into effect next year unless Congress directs otherwise—should avoid any abrupt slump in government price guarantees.

The President, in his message to the State of the Union, said full details of the administration's new farm program will be laid before lawmakers in a special message next Monday.

But he outlined enough of the program Thursday to indicate that it may be headed for rough sledding on Capitol Hill. Farm leaders in and out of Congress are sharply divided over the issue of price supports. Some, including most members of the House Agriculture Committee, favor present high-level floors.

Others, including Chairman Aiken (R-Vt.) of the Senate Agriculture Committee and Sen. Anderson (D-Mt.), former secretary of agriculture, favor flexible supports. Both Aiken and Anderson praised the President's farm proposal.

Congressional reaction to the farm portion of Thursday's presidential message was divided largely along the lines of members' individual views on the price support controversy.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic National Committee said Thursday President Eisenhower's outline of a new farm program seems clearly to point to a "flexible" system of price supports which it said is a "direct violation" of the Eisenhower campaign pledge.

U. N., Commies Reply to India Memorandum

SEOUL (AP) — Allied and Communist replies to a highly secret Indian memorandum carried the two commands closer to a showdown Friday over the status of 22,000 Chinese and Red Korean prisoners who refuse to go home.

The Communists demanded that "come-home" explanations be resumed to the prisoners and that all refusing repatriation be held in neutral custody until some indefinite time when a peace conference deals with them.

The U. N. Command restated its insistence that all prisoners must be released to civilian status Jan. 23.

Citizenship Loss Proposal Brings Study

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower's proposal to strip convicted Red conspirators of their American citizenship drew thunderous applause in Congress Thursday. But a good deal of uncertainty developed as to just what the President's suggestion could accomplish.

Justice Department officials, after some hours of head-scratching and searching law books, said an American so "de-citizenized" would become an alien in the eyes of the law, even though the dictionary speaks of an alien as a person originating in another country.

Officials said under the Eisenhower proposal such persons might also have to do such things as register as aliens and report every change of address to the government.

These officials said passports "undoubtedly" would be denied those stripped of citizenship, thus preventing them from going abroad. The McCarran Law already forbids issuance of passports to communists.

Here are the other disadvantages which Justice Department lawyers said might befall a "de-citizenized person" under state laws:

1—Inability to inherit or otherwise acquire property in some states.

2—Ineligibility to practice some professions or trades. Lawyers, for example, must be citizens.

3—Inability to work for many government agencies.

4—Inability, in many states, to work for a private employer on a public contract.

At present, Americans can be deprived of their citizenship only for treason, bearing arms against the United States or swearing allegiance to a foreign power.
