EAST SALEM-Polio hit the country in much the same manner as World War II, Ray Keaton told the Hoover P-TA Monday night in describing how the March of Dimes works.

The country was unprepared to combat polio until it became epidemic in many places. Since the start of the March of Dimes in 1938 there have been three programs of attack with a fourth getting under way on a large scale this year.

### New Hospital Receives 627 Cases in 1953

STAYTON-Santiam Memorial Hospital admitted 627 patients during 1953 following its opening in April, a lear-end report disclos. Tuesday.

Another 1,562 persons were treated as out-patients and 158 babies were born at the hospital here, including seven sets of twins. The report listed 392 lab oratory tests and 144 surgical cases.

Seven directors for the new hos-pital will be elected by stock-holders by mail ballot this month. The ballots will be opened on the date of the annual meeting, Jan. 21, at 8 pm. at the City Hall.
