

Vikings Spilled By Sparts 52-38

Third Loss in Row; Jayvees Win

CORVALLIS—(Special)—Corvallis High's tight zone defense and 6-7 Center Dave Gambee proved much too difficult for the Salem Vikings Tuesday night, with the Spartans taking the Big Six League basketball crucial by a 52-38 count. After Salem held a brief 7-6 lead in the first quarter, Corvallis broke loose to take command 12-10 at the quarter, 22-14 at halftime and 38-19 at the third stop. The loss was Salem's first in league play. The win firmly established Corvallis as the circuit leader.

Gorkys Again Post Victory In Mat Match

The bearded Gorky Brothers again posted a tag team triumph at the Armory last night, downing the Carl Engstrom-George Dusette tandem when Soldat put his favorite "wolf leap" crusher on Engstrom in the final fall.

All was not peace and quiet before the climax, however. There were plenty of fireworks when Engstrom ran afoul Ivan Gorky's knee, and Soldat tried to get in an extra kick at the fallen cleaner. Referee Tony Ross got into it also, and he unloaded a few solid whacks on Soldat before the brawl was cleared up.

The first fall went to the Gorkys when Ivan applied a back-breaker hold to Dusette and pinned him. Dusette got the second fall on Soldat with an elbow smash to the face and a press. The Gorkys screamed that Ref Ross gave them a "quick" count on this one and refused to go on if Ross continued in the ring.

Tony moved to the outside and Bronco Lublich, who had been the second referee on the outside, moved inside. The brawl had lots of action, which was pleasing to the fans.

In the semiwildup Big Ivan Kamoroff made a hit with the crowd by taking all of Kurt von Poppenheim's nasty stuff and going to a sizzling fall each draw. It was also a lively mix. And in the opener The Great Yamato, a surprise sub on the card, lost via disqualification to Lublich because he wouldn't break his illegal holds.

Gambee tossed in six field goals and 10 free throws for 22 points, leading the scoring by a big margin. Salem's best was provided by reserve Herb Triplett, who connected for seven markers.

Salem's combined starting lineup was held to 15 points.

The setback was the third in a row for the slumping Vikings who next play Bend at Salem Friday and Saturday nights.

Coach Harold Hauk's crew could hit only 240 from the field in the Spartans mix, making good with but a dozen two-pointers. Corvallis was a bit better with 15 field goals and a .341 average.

Both Hauk and Coach Tommy Holman of the Spartans used all their subs in the mix when the clash turned into a rout.

A field goal by Dale Jones and his following free throw in the final 28 seconds provided the Viking Jayvees with a narrow 43-41 win in the prelim Tuesday, retaining their unbeaten status and knocking over the Corvallis seconds for the first time this season.

'Must' for Ex-Champion . . . Charles vs. Satterfield Tonight in Crucial Mix

CHICAGO (AP)—Ezzard Charles, former heavyweight champion close to a short at Rocky Marciano's title, is a 3-1 favorite to dispose of dangerous Bob Satterfield in a 10-rounder which seems unlikely to go the distance at the Chicago stadium Wednesday night.

Satterfield, as much a boxing enigma as his fellow Chicagoan Johnny Bratton, is a belter who either knocks out his man, or gets knocked out himself in a hurry.

The national - televised bout reportedly would put a victorious Charles in the ring against Marciano in a June title bout at New York or San Francisco.

Betting is comparatively light on the fray which is tabbed to end abruptly with Satterfield swinging from the opening bell in hopes of a knockout before the far better - boxing Charles hammers him groggy as he did young Coley Wallace recently.

Satterfield has a 32-14-2 record with 25 knockout victories and being knocked out 9 times himself. Of his 48 pro fights, only 14 went the route.

Charles, at 32, is about as near a chance for a bout with Marciano as he will ever be. The Cincinnati Negro at 188 will have a six pound weight pull over the 182-pound Satterfield, listed as a light heavyweight.

Chicago Bout Set April 2

Scrap One of Year's Top Ring Features

CHICAGO (AP)—Canny Kid Gavilan, king of the welterweights, Tuesday was given his chance to reign over the 160-pound boxing division with a middleweight title shot against champion Bob Olson in Chicago Stadium April 2.

Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, announced final plans of the much-discussed 15-round championship match which promises to be one of the main boxing attractions of the year.

It will be televised nationally with the Chicago area blacked out. Since making his seventh successful welter title defense against Johnny Bratton in the Stadium last November, Gavilan has been busy making a moving picture of his life story in Havana under the auspices of the Cuban government. He persistently has passed up other defenses of his welterweight title to concentrate on the middleweight crown.

Since the time he pounded Bratton into a pulp for a 15 round decision, Gavilan has insisted he be finished with the welterweight division and would, like Sugar Ray Robinson, go after the 160-pound crown. Robinson made the grade, smashing Jake LaMotta out of the title in February, 1951, in a 13th round TKO at the Stadium before 16,000 fans.

Robinson retired from the ring after he went for the light heavyweight championship against Joey Maxim in June, 1952, at New York. Robinson could not answer the bell for the 14th round because of heat exhaustion.

Robinson's vacated middleweight title was won by the sturdy Olson who defeated England's Randy Turpin in New York Oct. 21. Olson has not fought since.

The title of the Olson-Gavilan affair involved San Francisco, the middleweight champions' current home, and Chicago Stadium. The latter was chosen, apparently, because of Gavilan's terrific popularity in the city. The kid attracted a gate of \$274,000 against Chuck Davey and \$176,000 against Bratton in the Stadium last year.
