

LOS ANGELES (#) - Defensive giants of the Eastern All Stars crashed the Western squad of the National Football League Sunday and rolled on to a 20 to 9 victory in the fourth annual Pro Bowl game.

Place-kicking artist Lou Groza of Cleveland's Browns turned two enemy fumbles into a pair of field goals and Chuck Bednarik, 230pound Philadelphia linebacker, intercepted a pass and charged 24 yards for a touchdown that cinched the game of the Easterners.

The triumph was the first for Cleveland's master coach, Paul Brown, in eight cracks at Buddy Parker of the league champion Detroit Lions.

Lou the Toe's field goals, booted from 11 and 25 yards out, followed fumbles in the first and third periods by fullback Joe Perry of the San Francisco 49ers. In each case Perry surrendered the ball immediately on impact with the giant Eastern linemen.

The field goals put the East into a 6-2 lead and Bednarik's mighty run after intercepting a Bobby

Layne pass made it 13-2. The West pulled up to 13-9 on a 16-yard run by Perry, with the challenge ended soon after when Cleveland's Ray Renfro ran 25 yards to ice the game.
