Mrs. Clarence B. Grund of Monmouth and Harold N. Lichtenheler of Dayton are president and commander of the two district groups.

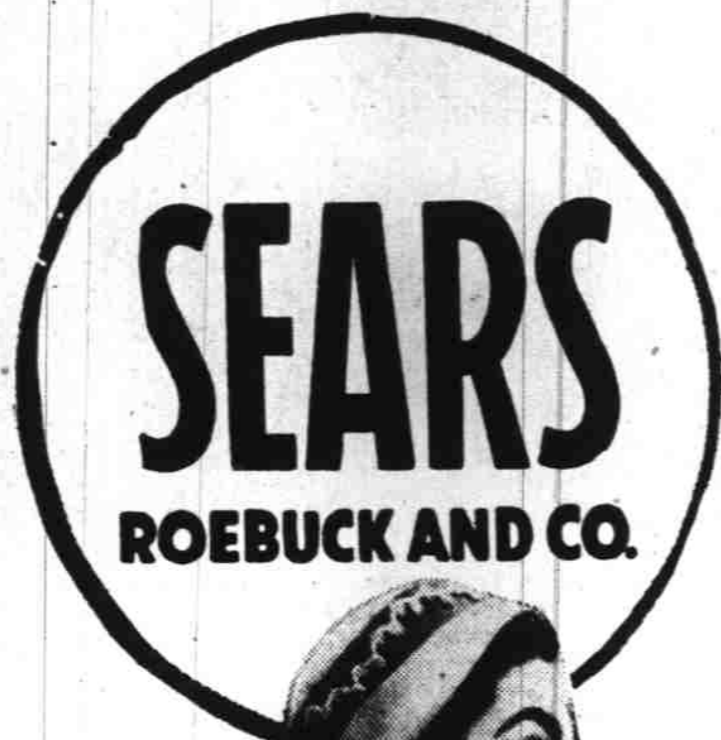
Prof. Cochran is Dinner Speaker
