Bill to 'De-Control' Eight Indian Tribes Submitted to Congress

WASHINGTON — Secretary of the Interior McKay announced Wednesday that proposed bills to provide for ending federal control of Indian affairs in eight tribal jurisdictions have been submitted to Congress. The bills would affect all Indians in California, Florida and New York and the Flatheads of Montana, the Klamath and Grande Ronde-Siletz groups of Oregon, the Turtle Mountain Chippewas of North Dakota, and four tribes under the jurisdiction of the Indian Bureau's Potawatomi area field office at Horton, Kan.

Court Upholds Multnomah Conviction

The conviction of E. J. Vaughn, Multnomah County, on a charge of assault while armed with a dangerous weapon, was upheld by the State Supreme Court Wednesday in an opinion written by Justice William C. Perry. Circuit Judge E. K. Oppenheimer presided at the trial. The jury, during its deliberations, asked the trial judge to redefine the term "feloniously" and to read excerpts from the testimony. Appeal to the supreme court was based on refusal of the judge to comply with the request. Justice Perry held that compliance with the jury's request was discretionary with the trial judge and that since it did not appear that the defendant was prejudiced by such failure there appeared no abuse of discretion by the court.

David Crockett Death Laid to Heart Attack

A heart attack caused the death last Saturday night of David O. Crockett, 52, of 1393 Franklin St., the family physician said Wednesday following an autopsy. Crockett was pronounced dead on arrival at a Salem hospital after falling at the West Salem American Legion Hall. Funeral services for Crockett, warehouse manager for the Monroe Feed Store, Corvallis, were held Wednesday at 2 p.m. in Virgil T. Golden Chapel. Interment was at Crestlawn Memorial Park.

Faith in U.S. People Needed, Stinnett Says

Faith in the creative ability of the American people is needed greatly in the long view of American public education, Salem Teachers Association was told Wednesday night by Dr. T. M. Stinnett, Washington, D.C., a National Education Association official.

Without such faith, and without "faith in tomorrow and faith in the creative power of freedom," said Stinnett, the citizens tend to "view with fear" the rising costs of education. The speaker said that 10,800 births a day in the U.S. means school teachers and classrooms must be added.

But some "enemies of education," he continued, argue that school costs are so high that only a top percentage should be educated. This, said Stinnett, shows lack of faith in "the creative ability of the people, through which our nation has grown."

Bouse Ready For New Trial

ROSEBURG — Thomas S. Bouse was returned here Tuesday from the Oregon State Prison for a new trial on a first degree murder charge. The State Supreme Court ordered the trial after reversing an earlier conviction, for which he had been sentenced to die. Bouse is charged with the bathtub slaying of his wife late in 1952.
