Radio Slates Broadcast of 'The Big Story'

"The Big Story" of Statesman Reporter James Burr Miller will be broadcast by transcription Sunday over radio station KGW at 8 p.m.

Locally the program is to be re-broadcast over radio station KOCO Wednesday at 8 p.m. and over KGAE the following Sunday (time to be announced later).

The program will dramatize a front page story which Miller wrote for The Statesman in November, 1952. The story concerns the surrender to Miller of a young man, wanted for murder in Douglas County, and the subsequent freedom gained by this man with the aid of the reporter.

The program, sponsored by Pall Mall cigarettes, is a weekly presentation of the NBC network. Miller has been advised by a New York agent that the story appears adaptable to television and may be televised in the next month or so as well as published in "The Big Story" magazine.

Selection by this program of a reporter's story carries a \$500 award and a bronze plaque engraved with the name of the reporter and his newspaper.

Credit Group To Mark 20 Years Service

Twenty years of service to farmers in the Willamette Valley will be completed Saturday when members of the Willamette Production Credit Association hold their annual stockholders meeting at the Marion Hotel. Over 400 are expected to attend the session which begins at noon with a buffet luncheon.

The credit organization received its charter Jan. 23, 1934, under Farm Credit Act of 1933. Three of the original directors still serve on the board and will be honored at the meeting. These are John Ramage, Woodburn; George H. Fullenwider, Carlton; and E. W. McMindes, Astoria. Other directors are H. A. Barnes, Silverton, and E. A. McCormack, Eugene.

Otto F. Allgaier, treasurer of the Production Credit Corporation of Spokane, will be the speaker at the Saturday meeting.

Stockholders from 13 counties in Oregon, will be welcomed by President William Hammond of the Salem Chamber of Commerce, which is cooperating in arrangements for this meeting.

Polio Vaccine Trials Gain County Okeh

Approval of Marion County school and medical leaders for possible poliomyelitis vaccine trials in the future was sought in a letter from Dr. Harold M. Erickson, State Health officer.

The letter was read during the regular monthly meeting of the Marion County Department of Health this week.

It was suggested by Erickson that the county superintendent of schools and the local medical society give their okeh in case Marion County is selected as one of the many counties in the nation to try this vaccine. Procuring this stamp of approval in advance was suggested in order that no unnecessary delays or embarrassments might result should Marion County be one of those chosen.

The annual report, presented during this meeting, showed that 2,748 births in the county for 1953 fell short by 24 of those of the preceding year and deaths were 44 less than 1952. Of the total number of babies born, 123 were females. Of the total deaths for 1953, 497 were men and 375 women. Infant deaths (under one month) were listed at 375 for 1953 as compared to 407 during 1952.

Chief cause of death during 1953 was listed as heart failure which claimed 32 in the county. Second cause of death during this year was cancer which claimed 13 lives during the year. Automobile accidents claimed 19 lives in 1953 as compared to 20 during 1952.

All deaths during last December totalled 68 as compared to 87 for the same month of 1952.

The current issue of Time magazine contains in its section on art a full page reproduction in color of a portion of the mosaic Station of the Cross in the abbey church at Mt. Angel.

The mosaic is the work of Louisa Jenkins of California, who as reported by Time "studied the masterpieces of mosaic art in Northern Italy, then found new techniques of her own. Besides the traditional Italian mosaic glass she uses lava rock, iridescent furnace slag, crystal, quartz, mica and pyrites to produce extraordinarily various effects."

The church at the abbey was dedicated in 1852.
