# **Board Might Fight Rule on** Reformatory

The Oregon state emergency board said Friday it might go to court to overturn Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton's opinion that the state board of control can't buy the site for the proposed state reformatory.

The board instructed Sam Haley, legislative counsel, to see what steps could be taken to get a court decision.

The emergency board, consisting of nine legislators, said it was clearly the legislature's intent that the board of control should buy the site out of the \$1,250,000 appropriation for the new institution.

The matter came on the emergency board's agenda by a request from the board of control for funds to buy the site.

Members of the board were sharply critical of Thornton's opinion. Rep. David Baum, La Grande, said "we can't run this state on






