City Industrial Development Group Lauded

Salem's Industrial Development Council was lauded Monday by Ivan Bloch, Portland industrial consultant, in a talk before the Salem Chamber of Commerce at a Marion Hotel luncheon.

The council offers "a unique opportunity for the Salem area," the speaker said. But the best plan won't bring results unless much work is done by many people, Bloch cautioned.

He said Oregon faces a psychological hazard in industrial development because of a long-standing "strong back and sharp axe" feeling—that is, emphasis only on raw materials development. Fields that should be exploited with local capital are in plastics, light metal fabrication, electronics and chemicals.

Eastern Industrialists Show Interest in Using Oregon Wood

Members of the Oregon development commission, in conference with Gov. Paul L. Patterson Monday, said they are negotiating with a number of eastern industrial leaders who have expressed an interest in establishing specialty industries using Oregon lumber.

Also attending the conference were heads of a number of state departments. Lawrence R. Teeple, Portland, commission chairman, said the commission had reached the definite conclusion that Oregon's most outstanding need at the present time is more diversified industries.

Purpose of the conference was to discuss Oregon's unemployment situation and how to find jobs for many persons who are now seeking work.

64,000 Unemployed
Gov. Patterson said there are approximately 64,000 persons unemployed in Oregon. He said 94,000 were unemployed at the same time in 1950.

George Spaur, state forester, said a number of logging and milling industries are preparing to resume operations. He referred to the filing of more than 3,000 applications for logging permits this month as compared with only 2,000 in January a year ago.

He said some logging operations could not be resumed until weather conditions are more favorable.

Meffert to Join OSEA Staff on February 1

Rudy Meffert, now a state employee, will join the staff of the Oregon State Employees Association on Feb. 1, it was announced Monday by Forrest Stewart, executive-secretary of OSEA.

The addition of Meffert will increase the OSEA staff to six employees, Stewart said. Meffert's new duties will include the handling of employee grievances, gathering statistical data regarding personnel operations in the general operation of OSEA—which in an organization of state employees.

He is originally from the East where he was educated and employed by several banks and in Europe as an investment representative. He supervised payroll procedure when the Federal Social Security Act was inaugurated. He enlisted in the U. S. Marines in 1942 and served in the Pacific prior to his discharge in 1946.

Since then he has held federal appointments as a traveling auditor in Western states and since 1952 has been employed with the Motor permit section in the State Public Utilities Commission offices here. He has been active in OSEA affairs.
