Stock Market Closes Steady In Comeback

NEW YORK (U)—The stock market in a display of strength Thursday made a smart comeback from its lulls and managed to close with a fair degree of steadiness.

The steel section as a whole was unchanged to higher. Radio-television stocks were higher as were some oils and most utilities. The remainder of the market was unchanged to lower.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 10 cents at \$112.50, the second straight decline in session after Tuesday's sharp advance.
