Sauer and Good

Kraut Favorite of Europeans on American Menus With Pork or Beef

Sauerkraut, one of the old world favorites, and a specialty of many American families with German backgrounds, is a vegetable we should put more often on our menus.

Sauerkraut and pork of a variety of cuts, sauerkraut with potatoes and sour cream and sauerkraut with beef are all strictly old-world, but good for Americanables, too.

Here is a recipe from the Pennsylvania Dutch, which smacks of the old German.

BRISKET OF BEEF WITH KRAUT AND DUMPLINGS
3 pounds brisket of beef 2 tablespoons shortening
1 1/2 quarts sauerkraut Salt and pepper
1 onion, sliced
Melt shortening in a large kettle and brown the onion in it. Then add meat which has been well seasoned with salt and pepper. (Remember kraut is salty, too). Add sauerkraut and cover with boiling water. Cook slowly for 2 hours or until meat is tender. Make dumpling dough, cut in squares and place on top of meat and kraut. Cover pan tightly and cook for 25 minutes. Serve at once.

DUMPLING DOUGH
2 cups flour 3/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon butter Milk
1 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
Sift flour and baking powder and salt into a bowl. Add butter and work in with pastry blender or finger tips. Add enough milk to make a stiff batter. Turn out on a floured board and roll about 1/4 inch thick. Cut in small squares and drop in hot liquid. Be sure lid of utensil fits very tight or dumplings will be heavy.

Then another that uses Sauerkraut a la Hungaria:
SAUERKRAUT HUNGARIAN
1 1/2 pounds sauerkraut 1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 cups sour cream 1/2 cup bacon or ham drippings
3 medium sized potatoes 8 whole cloves
2 medium sized onions, chopped 1 teaspoon caraway seeds
2 bay leaves
Drain sauerkraut and cook with the cream for 1 1/2 hours. Add potatoes, peeled and grated, salt, pepper, and other ingredients. Cover pan and continue cooking for 3/4 hour more. Sauerkraut, according to an Alsatian recipe, can be cooked in a casserole which is elaborate but interesting:

SAUERKRAUT AND SAUSAGES
16 slices bacon 8 to 10 smoked or fresh sausages
2 quarts sauerkraut 3 cups stock
6 smoked pork loin cutlets 8 frankfurters
3 onions
Line bottom of casserole with half the bacon, add sauerkraut and put sausages, onion (each stuck with a clove) and cutlets on top. Put rest of bacon on top, add liquid and cover casserole tightly. Cook 1 1/2 hours, uncover, add franks and cook 15 minutes without boiling. Arrange sauerkraut on a heated platter, surround with meat and sauce and serve with boiled potatoes in their jackets.

OCE to Get \$75,000 Swim Pool as Wolverton Memorial

MONMOUTH — A bequest of approximately \$75,000 in the will of Grant S. Wolverton, will be used to construct a swimming pool at Oregon College of Education, OCE President Robert J. Maaske said Friday.

Plans call for the pool to be completed by next fall or winter. It will be constructed as an addition to the west side of the OCE physical education building and will be enclosed to permit year-round use for recreation and instruction.

Decision to select the pool as a memorial to Wolverton's parents, John and Mary Wolverton, was made by a committee of three specified in the will. They were two nieces, Mrs. Clarence L. Mackey and Mrs. Grace Leto Daniel of Portland, and President Maaske. The parents were pioneer residents of Monmouth and Grant Wolverton graduated from the college here in 1883. The family lived for many years on the present OCE campus in the house now used as the Music Hall.

He married Helen E. Lewis in Portland, Aug. 27, 1910. She and two daughters, Mrs. Leola Hood, Gold Hill, and Mrs. Dorothy Chisholm, Medford survive as do two brothers and four grandchildren. Services will be held at 2 p.m. Monday at Jefferson First Christian Church under direction of Fisher Mortuary, Albany. The Rev. Merwin McGill will officiate. Burial will be at Jefferson.

Convicted Arsonists Seek New Trial

ALBANY — Mr. and Mrs. Kermit A. Molitor, Sweet Home, convicted Jan. 15 of first-degree arson, Friday filed with Linn County Clerk R. M. Russell for a new trial. The Molitors, already tried twice, were sentenced to three years in the penitentiary, but a stay of execution was granted.

Defense Attorney Wallace Johansen in the motion said "evidence adduced upon trial was insufficient to justify a verdict of the jury finding the defendants guilty of arson in the first degree." All evidence in the case was circumstantial, the motion claimed.

The Molitors are being held in Linn County jail in fault of \$2,000 bond each. Their final disposition awaits a hearing on the motion. They were convicted of setting fire to their Sweet Home residence May 15, 1953. A jury failed to reach a decision in the first trial.

Storm Floods Basements at Lyons

LYONS — Water was receding Friday in many of the Lyons basements that were flooded during the heavy rain Wednesday and early Thursday. Telephone service remained out for approximately 40 users on six lines served through Lyons, but long-distance had been restored to all cities except Stayton Friday afternoon.
