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One of the attractive modern homes in Dallas is the John W. Kitzmiller residence on Oak Street. A feature of the spacious one-story home with central hallway are the lovely large picture windows from ceiling to floor in the living, dining and breakfast rooms and kitchen overlooking the garden and patio. 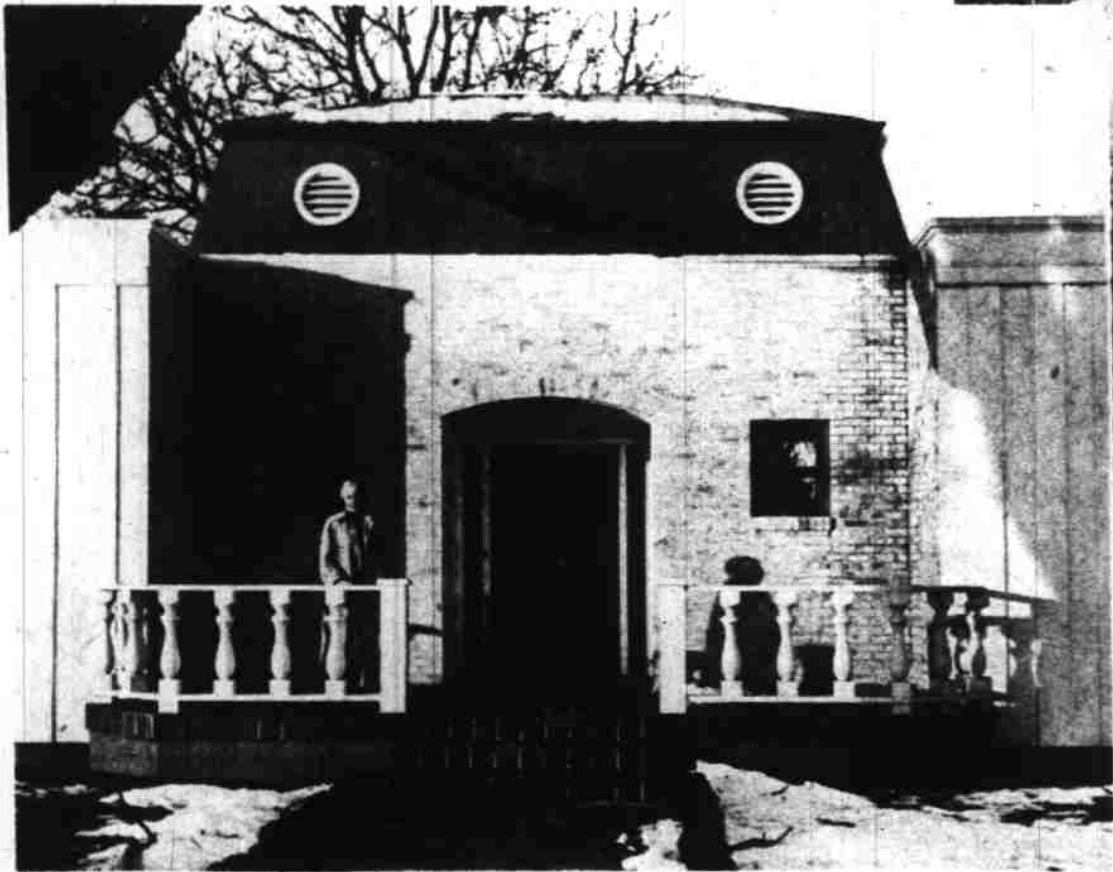

Redwood is used in the hall and den with olive green carpeting with hemlock in the hallway leading to the bedrooms. The wood in the kitchen and breakfast room is of birch with bright red decor. The Kitzmiller's eldest son, John Jr., is a freshman at Stamford.



The Maurice Daltons chose a French colonial style home, at the far left, when they built a year ago on the Dallas property, which belonged to Mr. Dalton's father. Mrs. Dalton is pictured in the lovely living room at the left with one entire wall of windows overlooking the garden. Outstanding features of the Cecil F. Dunn home in Dallas on Hayter Street are the unusual color schemes and fireplace wing in the living room, which is situated in the center of the one-story residence. Below is an outside view of the Dunn home painted a pomegranate red and white with cape cod style bay windows.
