KAWANA, Japan (U) - Marilyn Monroe, having taken her Army "shots," came here to rest Saturday in this golf resort town before going to Korea to sing "Somebody Loves Me" to the pop-eyed soldiers.

The shapely actress, whose blonde hair was a beacon in Tokyo for swarms of autograph-seeking fans in this brunette nation, was smiling but obviously exhausted on arrival here to join her husband, baseball's Joe Di Maggio.

She was feeling the effects of the inoculations, a nervous stomach upset and the fatigue of celebrity touring.

But she went ahead with plans for a four-day visit to Korea in response to a deluge of requests from soldiers. She will leave for Korea Feb. 16.

'No Raiding' Deal Failing In Union Vote

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (U) - Any effective application of the negotiated AFL-CIO "no raiding" agreement appeared in jeopardy Friday when AFL President George Meany conceded only about 40 out of 110 AFL unions have agreed so far to go along with the plan.

The pact is designed to prevent a union from one federation from trying to take over members already organized by a union of the rival federation and is regarded as the first step toward an actual AFL-CIO merger.

The agreement was negotiated by Meany and CIO President Walter Reuther, but while the CIO has announced that virtually all its unions have agreed to sign a pact, many top AFL unions apparently are reluctant to sign.

Meany, whose prestige and power within the AFL may be at stake in the situation, said the fact that only 40 AFL unions have agreed to go along should not be taken too seriously because major AFL groups are waiting to consider the matter at their own union meetings within the next month.

Dave Beck, president of the Teamsters Union which is the largest AFL affiliate with nearly 1 1/2 million members, is apparently the chief holdout.

Meany reportedly had been hopeful of getting a commitment from Beck at the current meeting of the AFL Executive Council, but Beck has arranged a meeting of his own Executive Board here next week and is avoiding any commitment until then.

Added Forest Highways' Fund Sought

WASHINGTON (U) - Six Western congressmen asked a House Appropriations Subcommittee Friday to increase recommended appropriations for forest highways construction from 10 million to at least 22 1/2 million dollars.

They were Republican Reps. Mack, Horan and Westland, all of Washington; Ellsworth and Norblad of Oregon; and Rhodes of Arizona.

While most states would be affected by the increase, the largest federal forest reserves are in the 10 Western states and it is there that the increase would be most effective. The money, if appropriated, would be allocated to states on a 50-50 matching fund basis.

The congressmen noted that the federal government collected some 75 million dollars from the sale of federal timber last year and said they felt allocation of 30 per cent of these receipts for highway construction within the forests was not too much.

They noted also that Congress already has authorized appropriations of \$53,400,000 for this purpose which has not been appropriated.

Capps Used Car Lot Sold

The new owners, Joe Rouse and Blair Moss, announced that the firm name will be changed this week to "Joe and Moe Used Cars." The previous owner said his future business plans were undecided.

Medical Plan Available To OSEA Membership

Members of the Oregon State Employees Association — 5,000 strong — will become eligible to enroll in a new medical and hospital insurance plan March 1, according to Forrest Stewart, executive secretary of the employees association.

"Coverage under the plan will be available only to association members and their families," Stewart said. "But any state employee may join both the medical plan and the association during special enrollment drives which we plan to conduct."

Stewart said Oregon Physicians Service, the originator of the plan, will act as underwriter. Joseph E. Harvey Jr., OPS general manager said this is the first time such a plan of low cost, broad coverage and a deductible feature like automobile insurance has been offered the public by a Blue Shield doctor-sponsored plan.

"Several unusual features of the new plan are included in the medical and hospital benefits," Stewart said. "Monthly dues rates will run about 30 per cent less than most other plans, and the benefits, after the member pays the first \$25 expense for an illness or accident, are considerably broader than in other plans."

"General medical care including home and office visits by doctors, diagnostic x-rays and laboratory test, will be provided for dependents as well as the employees. Benefits also renew themselves each year, permitting care of long, drawn-out illnesses."

Monthly rates, said Stewart, will average \$3.14 for male employees, \$3.87 for women, \$7.22 for man and wife and \$9.74 for an entire family.

In any year a subscriber is entitled to 70 days hospitalization at \$12 per day plus 90 per cent of the cost of hospital "extras," doctors' services during hospitalization plus 35 home or office calls (after the first \$25 deductible), private room, special nursing and ambulance services in serious cases.

Stewart said he planned an extensive "statewide, educational and enrollment campaign" during the coming months. Every state employee, he said will be given an opportunity to study the plan and to enroll in it.

Four Brewing Firms Draw Oregon Ban

PORTLAND (U) - Four breweries can't bring any more beer into Oregon for periods ranging from 10 to 15 days because salesmen either gave free beer to retailers or set up drinks to customers.

Both practices are forbidden under the ruling against giving financial assistance to retailers.

The breweries and penalties given Friday by the State Liquor Commission: Lucky Lager of Vancouver, 10 days; Sick's of Seattle, 10 days; Hall's of St. Paul, 10 days; and Ballantine's of Newark, 15 days.

In Seattle, a spokesman for Sick's said the penalty against the firm was on an allegation that an agent spent \$1.80 in a tavern and gave six cans of beer to an Oregon retailer.

Slayer Taken To Roseburg For Retrial

Thomas S. Bouse, who was released at the state Penitentiary late in 1953, following conviction on a first-degree murder charge at Roseburg, has been returned there for retrial, state prison officials said Friday.

He was charged with drowning his wife in a bathtub and was sentenced to death in the penitentiary lethal gas chamber.

The State Supreme Court reversed the conviction and ordered a new trial. The high court held that improper evidence was introduced at the trial in the Douglas County Circuit Court. Reversal of the conviction automatically stayed the execution.

Bouse will be defended by Ray B. Compton, practicing attorney in Roseburg for 31 years.

West Coast Wins Airmail Contract

WASHINGTON (U) - West Coast Airlines, serving Washington, Oregon and Idaho, will start carrying first class mail sometime this month if a proposal made Friday by the Civil Aeronautics Board goes into effect.

The CAB recommended a one-year experiment in moving first class mail by air on the nation's local service, or "feeder," airlines.
