Inheritance Reorganized The Collector of Internal Revenue office in the Salem Post Office will remain open six days a week during the two weeks preceding the filing deadline, March 15, R. C. Granquist, district director, appounced Friday.

Collections of the state inherit-ance tax division of the state Treasury Department, through complete reorganization of office and field staffs, are expected to total approximately \$6,500,000 during the 1953-55 biennium, State Treasurer Sig Unander said Friday.

The previous biennium high was approximately \$5,000,000. Unander said that because of

In Settlement
