

Demo Says Governor, Lincoln D.A. 'Mislead Public' in Vice Probe

PORTLAND (U)—Howard Morgan, Democratic state chairman, Saturday accused the governor and the Lincoln County district attorney of trying to mislead the public about vice conditions in Lincoln County.

It was in Lincoln County that a group called for an investigation by the state attorney general several months ago. Gov. Patterson looked into the situation and said he saw no need for such action.

Dist. Atty. William Hollen of Lincoln County at that time cited a grand jury report, which he said noted that the vice situation had already been corrected.

Morgan said a Democratic meeting here that the governor said there was no evidence of lawless-

ness in Lincoln County, and that none of the grand jurors had complained to him. Actually, said Morgan, the governor had in his possession then a letter from the foreman of the grand jury, Mrs. Victoria Albarn, in which she said there had been "a miscarriage of justice."

The governor said Saturday at Salem that he did not have Mrs. Albarn's letter before him or in his mind at the time he made the statement. He said he had received hundreds of letters on the case.

Morgan said, however, that the governor had replied to Mrs. Albarn's letter, saying that he might want to discuss the case with her.

Morgan said Hollen misquoted the grand jury report in announcing it to the press. Morgan said the grand jury reported, "Public apathy has contributed to the deplorable situation that existed and in a few instances still exists."

Morgan said Hollen deleted the latter reference to make it sound as if the vice situation had been cleared up completely.

Hollen said at Newport that the grand jury approved the statement he helped them prepare for the press, adding, "They were very anxious to make it plain that there was nothing in the present administration objectionable to them."

Morgan said, "Peace and quiet have not returned to Lincoln County. What is happening is that honest people of the county are slowly finding out what has been going on."

Yoshida Visit Report Said Misunderstood

WASHINGTON (U)—The White House said Saturday an announcement about a possible visit by Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida of Japan—which set off political fireworks in Tokyo—was a "misunderstanding."

Yoshida is fighting for his administration's political life in an upheaval over money scandals allegedly involving some cabinet ministers.

A White House announcement Friday night that the Japanese prime minister had been invited to visit the United States and had accepted brought angry cries from some of his opponents that this was U.S. intervention in the Japanese political struggle.

James C. Hagerty, President Eisenhower's press secretary, said Friday night's announcement was meant only to confirm that American Ambassador John M. Allison had told Yoshida informally that if he was coming to the United States, President Eisenhower would be happy to receive him.

Fire Destroys Home Garage

A fire, apparently caused by defective wiring, destroyed a garage at 325 Moyer Lane Saturday morning, city firemen reported.

The building had not been used as a garage for some time, firemen said, and contained only a hand lawn mower and some wire. Owner J. H. Moyer, 630 Union St., estimated the loss at \$1,000. H. A. Trinkle who tenants the place, was not home at the time of the blaze, firemen said.

Luther Charles Carey, Portland, was arrested by state police late Saturday night on a charge of driving while intoxicated. He was held in the city jail Saturday night in lieu of \$400 bail.

'Eat and Run' Prisoners Still Sought

PASCO (U)—A stolen car and a belated report of witnesses who said they saw two men get out of the back of a sheriff's panel truck in Kennewick were clues Saturday in the search for two "eat and run" prisoners being transported across state.

The reports were the first to offer a possible explanation of where Lloyd A. Henefin, 25, Bellingham, and Jack H. Raymond, 32, Everett, got out of a locked truck in which they were being taken from Everett to the state prison at Walla Walla Friday. They had been handcuffed together.

Their escort, Snohomish County Jail Superintendent Jim Hammond, arrived at the prison to find the back of his truck empty, a plate removed over a lock, and a note reading:

"Dear Jim: Sorry to eat and run but we have to catch a train."

Saturday Police Chief Al McKibben of Pasco said two witnesses had reported seeing two men get out of the back of such a truck about 3 p.m. Friday when it stopped for a stoplight in Kennewick, west of the bridge across the Columbia to Pasco. They noted nothing suspicious and made no report of seeing any handcuffs.

Shortly afterwards, at 3:05 p.m., Ralph Nachtmann, Pasco, notified police his automobile (1951 Plymouth, license plate 5512 FN) had been stolen from a parking place about four blocks away.

In another development, Pasco and Kennewick police and the sheriff's office received reports Saturday that the small postoffice at Plymouth, 30 miles south of Kennewick on the Washington side of the Columbia below McNary Dam, was broken into Friday night. Nothing definitely linked the burglary, however, with the men's escape.

A small amount of cash and stamps were taken, Mrs. J. M. Doyle, postmistress, reported. A postal inspector was en route from Portland to investigate.

Raymond was being transported to prison to serve time as an habitual criminal and Henefin after a forgery conviction.

Idaho Demo Lawyer Seeks Senate Seat

LEWISTON, Idaho (U)—Ray McNichols, Orofino attorney and prominent Idaho Democrat, announced his candidacy Saturday for his party's nomination for U.S. senator from Idaho.

He said he will seek the senate seat of Henry C. Dworshak, a republican, whose term expires this year.

McNichols, a life-long resident of northern Idaho, is the second democrat to declare his candidacy. Former Senator Glenn Taylor of Pocatello threw his hat in the ring earlier this month.

In a statement of the policies he would follow, McNichols criticized Dworshak as having "a voting record of adherence to the desires of big business." He added, "The people of Idaho are not big business people."

He said he would campaign for full development of the natural resources of the Northwest and for a party's "30-year program for social betterment."

Benefits from the development of resources should go to the people primarily, he said "rather than to any private enterprise."

McNichols, 38, keynoted his party's state convention in 1952 and that year also was an unsuccessful Democratic candidate for state senator from Clearwater County.

He was born in Lewiston and received his law degree at the University of Idaho after 3 1/2 years of service in the Navy. He is president of the five-county Clearwater District Bar Association.

House to Let Senate Launch Pay Hike Bill

WASHINGTON (U)—Presumably on the theory they have stuck their necks out far enough by voting to hike their pensions, House members are going to let the Senate carry the ball for a congressional pay raise.

If the Senate doesn't act, chances are there will be no pay boost, despite the recommendation of a special commission that salaries be hiked from \$15,000 to \$27,500 annually.

No Senate action is in prospect at this time.

An informal decision to have the Senate act first on any pay raise was disclosed by Chairman Chauncey Reed (R-Ill.) of the House Judiciary Committee.

Reed introduced a bill to put into effect the commission recommendation for higher salaries for congressmen and federal judges. It was referred to his committee.

But Reed said the committee has an understanding it will "let the Senate act first."

The House took the initiative in voting to liberalize the congressional pension program. The Senate finished action on it Friday and sent the necessary legislation to the White House for President Eisenhower's signature.

Now House members figure it's up to the Senate to make the first move for a congressional pay boost.

If the Senate does act, Reed said there won't be any difficulty about getting the pay raise bill approved by his committee.

Rabbi Urges Ike to Halt McCarthy

PORTLAND (U)—A Portland rabbi urged President Eisenhower Friday night to stop Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) in what the rabbi said were attacks on freedom.

"How long will you wait before the Constitution also is surrendered to McCarthy?" the Rabbi Julius J. Nodel asked in a letter read to his congregation at the Temple Beth Israel in weekly services.

"A showdown between you and McCarthy is inevitable. An entire nation is fearful and waiting. It wants to know now when you will put an end to McCarthy's revolution through power," the letter said.

He said the negotiations between Army Secty. Stevens and McCarthy gave the senator "permission to again make loyal Americans his helpless victims."

The success of McCarthy and others is encouraging "former Fascists, Jew-haters, Negro-haters, Catholic-haters, Protestant-haters to crawl out of their foul holes of darkness and begin to live again in the heyday for crackpots," the rabbi said.

He added that the letter is being sent to the President.

Photograph of Delta Wing Jet Released

WASHINGTON (U)—The Air Force Saturday released the first photograph of its first supersonic delta wing fighter plane, the F102.

Performance details still are secret on the plane, now in production by Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corp. at San Diego, Calif.

The Air Force announced in October, 1952, that it had ordered production of its first supersonic delta wing fighter.

There have been unverified published reports that the F102 has a Pratt and Whitney J57 jet engine—the same type used in the B52 bomber—and that it contains an automatic pilot and firing system.

Like all supersonic aircraft, it has complex automatic electronic controls.

The F102 has been described by some aviation experts as "nearly an inhabited missile, and possibly the final stage in piloted interception before the guided missile takes over completely."
