

### International Folk Dancers Will Be Hosts for Festival

On Sunday, March 14, Salem International Folk Dancers will be hosts to folk dancers of the northwest at the Salem Armory from one to five p.m. Over 200 dancers from Oregon and Washington are expected to be here for the festival.

There will be many colorful and authentic costumes and beautiful dances from many lands to delight the public, who are invited to attend free of charge.

Square dancing is the American form of folk dancing and there will be top callers to add to the pleasure of the festival. Exhibitions will be performed by southeast YMCA Paktaters of Portland, Oregon State College Folk Dancers of Corvallis, International Folk Dancers from Eugene, Roseburg and Portland.

Dancers will be reminded of St. Patrick by the decorations and some Irish dances. **First Festival** Although this will be the first festival sponsored by the local group, which has been organized only a year, international folk dancing is becoming more popular as a form of recreation and hobby with the American people each day. A world festival is presented each year in some part of Europe, where one may see beautifully costumed dancers doing their native dances held on arenas with a capacity of 14,000 people. Folk dance instructions are offered by the YMCA in Salem each Wednesday night. Salem International Folk Dancers meet on the first and third Saturday night each month at the YMCA.
