Cleanliness Is Next

Spring Cleaning Is Now a Process That Extends Throughout the Year

The matter of housecleaning which used to be a once-a-year major undertaking in every well-managed household, has become a carefully planned all-year affair.

In a recent Statesman, one of the home demonstration agents gave her ideas of a schedule for housecleaning, designed to cut the effort to a minimum.

We've picked up a few hints to cut down on the household cleaning tasks, some of which may not be very spectacular, but taken together mean considerable time saving.

For instance, once a week wipe off the fingermarks from around door handles with a rag dipped in sudsy water and wrung out. It takes but a few minutes then, but once the dirt accumulates and stands awhile it's more of a task.

NOT TOO NEAT

Another hint, when putting away the vacuum cleaner, wind up the cord loosely. It may look less neat, but too much tension on the fine wires within the cords may break them.

Make use of the commercially prepared waxed-floor cleaners. Applied to the floors, they will soften and remove old wax, then a new coating will look better and be easier to clean.

To get rid of the dust from the inner recesses of radiators, place a damp cloth behind and below the radiator. Adjust the cleaner for blowing. Insert crevice nozzle between radiator sections and blow dirt and dust from hidden ledges onto damp cloth.

HANDY HINTS

If your Venetian blinds are very soiled, you may want to wash them in the bathtub. To do so, fill the tub about two-thirds full of warm soapy water, and lift the blinds in and out of the suds until they're clean. Use a sponge on stubborn spots. Rinse the blinds in clear water, hang full length to drain, then wipe dry. Weight the bottom to keep the tapes from shrinking.

A good shortcut to washing off the ring from the bathtub is indicated here, but we don't know any.

Use a fine silver polish to clean the nickel and chromium parts of your refrigerator to prevent scratches.

Scratches on the furniture are annual concern of the housecleaner, and at least once a year she should try to take all possible mars from the furniture.

A careful washing with sudsy warm water, wiped quickly off, will remove some of the surplus wax or oil from the furniture, and often a good re-waxing job will cover up small scratches and white marks. One woman we know uses a bit of ox-blood shoe for her scratches.

Of course if the scratches have penetrated the wood, or the white spots bleached it, a good refinishing job by an expert may be the most practical solution.

If you plan to do your refinishing, if any necessary repairing before cleaning and scraping. If paint remover is used, a certain amount of the old color will enter the new patches and help them match the old.

Constitution Group Sets March 16 Meet

A meeting of the so-called constitution interim committee of the 1953 legislature will meet in the State Office building in Portland March 16, starting at 10 a.m.

The committee will discuss provisions of the state constitution relating to state finance, taxation and the executive and administrative departments.

Court Keeps Secrecy Over Bar Hearing

Secrecy has shrouded four days of a closed session in Marion County Circuit Judge Rex Kimmell's courtroom held this week and the private proceedings have been continued until next Wednesday.

The hearing was called by the State Supreme Court and a special panel of circuit judges selected to weigh evidence. Chairman of the panel is Circuit Judge Arlie Walker, McMinnville, with Lane County Circuit Judge William East and Judge Kimmell assisting.

Chief Justice Earl C. Latour-ette had previously explained that the case arose as a result of an appeal to the bar. He said that an applicant went through the normal channels of applying with the board of governors for admission to the bar and the board recommended that he not be admitted.

The man filed an appeal with the State Supreme Court and the panel was selected to hear the case. Findings of the hearing will be given to the State Supreme Court, presumably Wednesday if completed.

Members of the panel have refused to discuss the matter. It has been explained that an applicant to the bar must qualify scholastically and morally before being accepted.

Reports indicate this case involves an applicant who was refused admission on a morals charge.

"To the best of my knowledge there has never been a hearing of this nature here," explained Judge Walker in a telephone interview Friday. He pointed out that the circumstances surrounding the charges were such that publicity could be quite damaging whichever way the decision goes. With this in mind, both parties stipulated that it would be a closed session, the judge said.

Oregon Revised Statutes, section 1040 states, in part: "The sittings of every court are public, except that upon agreement of the parties to a civil action, suit or proceedings . . . the court may direct the trial, or any other proceedings to be private . . . all other persons shall be excluded except the officers of the court, the parties, their witnesses and counsel."

One observer noted that this section seems in direct conflict with Article One, section 10 of the Oregon Constitution which asserts, "No court shall be secret . . ."

Death Takes Mrs. Nordyke

Mrs. Frances L. Nordyke, 78, mother of Homer, Robert and LeVerne Nordyke, all of Salem, died Friday at her home in Newport. She had been in poor health for several weeks.

Mrs. Nordyke had lived in Newport for the past nine years and formerly lived for many years in Newberg. She came to Oregon from Idaho.

Besides three sons in Salem, she is survived by her widower, Lewis Nordyke, Newport; another son, Virgil Nordyke, Sierra Marde, Calif.; six daughters, Beatrice Dotson and Verle Dotson, both of Seattle, Helen Richard, Eugene, Dorothea Hart, Newport, Marguarite Egelston, St. Helens, and Mary Budeau, Portland.

Funeral services will be held Monday at 2 p.m. in the Hollingsworth-Smith Funeral Chapel, Newport, with vault interment at Friends Cemetery.

Vistica in County Commission Race as Filing Books Closed

The final day of candidacy filing for county posts concluded rather quietly in the courthouse at 5 p.m. Friday with only one additional filing for a prominent office and 36 filings for precinct committee posts.

Seeking the Marion County commissioner's post being voted on in the May primaries is A. M. Vistica, Woodburn Route 2.

His Republican contenders for this office include E. L. Rogers, the incumbent; Thomas A. Armstrong, E. A. Kurtz and J. Lawrence Siegmund.

In his declaration of candidacy, Vistica pledges, if elected, to " . . . strive for lower taxes, efficient and better county government and to spend less money for administrative projects so that more can be spent on county roads and the welfare."

Three Republican filings for the county assessor's post remained the only candidates for this office and include J. P. Schimberg, J. F. Remington and Harold Domogalla. County Recorder Herman Lanke is the only filed candidate for his office.

Two justices of the peace, T. C. Gorman, Woodburn, and Walter Bell, Stayton, have filed notices of their seeking reelection. Quintia B. Estell has previously filed his notice of candidacy for the justice of the peace office at Silverton. No filing was received from Mt. Angel.

At the county filing deadline Friday candidates for precinct committee posts totaled 23 Democrats and 144 Republicans.

Only one measure for the county ballot has been received to date, but County Clerk Henry Mattson explained that cities have until March 20 to file certification to the clerk for a measure to be placed on the ballot. The same applies to the secretary of state's office, Mattson said. The measure receiving an oke by the county court Friday for placement on the ballot involves a two mill levy for construction of a County Youth Center.

The bill provides for a tax levy of one-half a mill after the first year for maintenance of the center. The levy would be assessed for five years after the construction of the center. Total amount realized through the two-mill levy would be \$168,000 with the annual maintenance to be \$45,000.

In the case of an office with no declared candidate, Mattson explained that the clerk's office will have to make up a ballot providing for a "write-in" candidate.

Rotary, Izaak Waltons To Sponsor Scout Post

The Salem Rotary Club and Izaak Walton League will co-sponsor and explore scouting post, the scouting committees of the two groups announced Friday. Richard Wyatt will be the unit advisor.

Meeting place for the new unit which has 15 members will be the Izaak Walton Hall on the first and third Mondays of each month, Wyatt said.
