Bangs Disease At Low Level

A new low in bangs disease prevalence in Oregon was reached in 1953 when for the second straight year the percentage of reactors dropped below 1 per cent, the state agricultural department reported Friday.

The 1953 figure was 0.65 per cent, based on 1838 reactors found in 281,003 beef and dairy animals tested. This compares with 0.918 per cent in the 283,294 animals tested under the federal-state bangs disease eradication program.

Two counties in the state now have no reactors. These are Curry County with 1,356 cattle tested, and Hood River with 592 cattle. Marion County had the highest number of cattle tested—27,105—with only 107 reactors. Tillamook with 26,967 head had 233 reactors this past year. Polk County had 8,030 cattle tested and 53 reactors.

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Apprenticeship Plans Due at Monday Meet

The State Apprenticeship Council, at a meeting here Monday, will complete plans for reviewing a number of applications for apprenticeship training.

Officials said that with approximately 65 per cent of the state's apprentices having veteran status the need for vocational direction of new Korean veterans into trades will be discussed. A program also is being discussed to acquaint 1954 high school graduates with the apprenticeship method of on-the-job training in charge of the labor bureau.

Labor Commissioner W. E. Kinsey said that while field reports show the number of apprentices in the state at most constant for the past three months there is a backlog of eligible young men for apprenticeship trades in some areas.

Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton ruled Friday that operators of State Liquor agencies can run for the legislature.

But, he held, if they are elected, they would have to quit running the agencies, because legislators aren't permitted to have contractual relations with the state.

Baptists Pick Cates, Salem, Moderator

Ray Cates, Salem insurance man, was elected moderator of the Conservative Baptist Association of Oregon at the association's sixth annual meeting which concluded in Salem Friday.

Delegates Friday voted to establish a liberal arts college in conjunction with the Western Conservative Baptist Theological Seminary in Portland. A fund of \$10,000 was approved to start the college program.

Dr. John Houser of Lebanon, chairman of the college committee, said the association plans to use existing facilities at the seminary for the liberal arts college until growth makes expansion necessary.

Named to the office of vice moderator was the Rev. Alton L. Kintner, pastor of the Seaside Baptist Church, Seaside. Trustees are elected by the district associations which form the state group.

The Salem meeting, with a total registration of 568, set a new record for attendance at the group's annual conference, according to the Rev. Charles F. Loeis, director of Christian education.

Friday afternoon Miss Marjorie Shelley, missionary to the Belgian Congo for the Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society, told the group of her work among the natives. "There's a need for the Gospel of Christ in Africa," she declared, "and it's up to us as individuals to take it there."

Following the installation of officers Friday evening, delegates attended one of three banquets for men, women and young people.

Prep Orators Open Tourney At Willamette

The annual Oregon High School Speech Tournament, sponsored by Willamette University, began Friday afternoon, drawing a total of 220 contestants from 20 districts.

Speech competition continued into the night Friday and is slated to resume at 7:30 a.m. today, concluding with the awarding of trophies at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon.

The tournament is being conducted by the Willamette forensic squad under direction of H. Paul Johnson, administrative assistant in speech this year.

Competition today will consist of debates at 7:30 a.m. and 8:45 a.m. with finals at 10 a.m. in serious, humorous interpretation and extemporaneous speaking.

After the noon lunch there will be semi-finals in debate at 1 p.m. and finals of debate at 2:15 p.m. followed by presentation of trophies.

Individual events and junior division debate are being held in classrooms of Eaton, Collins and Waller Halls on campus and senior debate is being held at the Presbyterian Church.

Judge Races Loom in Mid-Valley Counties

Coach, Judge Race Enliven Polk Filings

DALLAS — Polk County political filings closed on a firm tone Friday with three new names in the hopper at Dallas and the entry of OCE football Coach Bill McArthur into the wide-open race for Polk County state representative.

McArthur is a Democrat. Four Republicans also seek Polk County's single seat in the lower house.

Filings here Friday were highlighted by that of Herman Van Well, a Democrat, for Polk County judge. He formerly filled the post for two terms. Two Republicans and two Democrats seek the office.

Commissioner Race

Others who filed Friday were Russell N. Steele, farmer in Greenwood District (Independence route 1), for county commissioner on the Republican ticket. He will oppose G. V. Rempel, Dallas route 1, incumbent Republican. No Democrats are running for commissioner.

Third filing Friday was that of Elmer D. Cook for another term as justice of the peace at West Salem. He is unopposed for the non-partisan office.

McArthur, who filed Thursday for state representative, has been head football coach at OCE, Monmouth, for seven years. He is 35 and seeks political office for the first time. He formerly was active in organizing Young Democrat clubs in Southern California.

The four Republicans who seek the nomination for representative are Mrs. B. O. Schuckling, Eola; Joe Harland, Rickreall; Dr. A. J. Olson, and Peter Frankatz, both of West Salem. The incumbent, Frank Farmer, is not running.

Two Races for Judge

Both Republican and Democratic primary races are on tap for county judge. The Republicans are C. F. (Jack) Hayes, the incumbent, and C. A. Barnhart. The Democrats are M. Jack Power and Van Well. All are Dallas residents.

Another primary race pits E. D. Roseman against E. B. Hamilton, incumbent, for county clerk. Both are Republicans.

Unopposed are County Surveyor Ralph Howe, a Republican, and Alvin Hulet, justice of the peace at Grand Ronde.

Two candidates for Polk County senator are unopposed in the primaries. They are Walter Beth, Republican, and Al Dembowski, Democrat.

The Yamhill County primaries will feature a five-way race for the Republican nomination for county judge.
